### New Year, New Opportunities to Serve

Welcome 2023! It seems the last half of 2022 whizzed by, and here we are at the beginning of 2023. A new year brings new opportunities and renewed hopes. One of my hopes for 2023 is that more of us connect with one another through regional and local gatherings. I am grateful and appreciate the convenience, lower cost, safety, ease and strides we have made in our ability to gather via zoom, but the energy and connection we gain from gathering in person is so much deeper. This year, since our gatherings will be smaller and closer to where each of us live, it is my hope that more of us can gather more often in person.

I also hope we can increase the number of members volunteering in FCM during 2023. As a person working full-time, I understand limited time. But, the more FCM members who volunteer, the less time each volunteer must give. I've listed three positions that need volunteers with a brief description of each position. If you are willing to serve in any of these positions, please let me know by emailing me at chairperson@fcmmail.org.

- 2024 National Assembly Committee this committee will do the groundwork to propose the location, theme, speakers, and budget for the National Assembly usually held the 3rd week of July in 2024 in a recommendation to the Circle.
- New Regional Vice Presidents in this first term, persons will be appointed Regional Vice Presidents in the new South-Central and Mid-Atlantic regions. The major responsibilities of an RVP are to represent their regions on the Circle, recommend candidates for commissioning, coordinate commissioning ceremonies, organize regional gatherings, facilitate communication within the region.
- Historian in this appointed position, this person will gather and prepare information to be preserved and archived.

The last hope I have for FCM in 2023 is for every member to donate to the **Endowment fund**. Whether you give a one-time donation of \$5, a recurring donation of \$5 per month, or a different amount at a different frequency, it is important that we all invest in the future of FCM. Building the endowment fund now is a way for current members to create a legacy for the benefit of future members. It is a way to make sure FCM is around for those who need an inclusive community or to be empowered from inclusive ministry in the future.

As we welcome 2023, let us consider and take advantage of these opportunities to gather and to serve by giving of our time and resources.

### A Letter from the President

The beginning of a new year is upon us. I don't know about you, but I find myself full of hope, joy, and peace. God is on the throne, and I know if we continue to live each day in God's will, all will be alright.

The Circle moved forward on the election for the Vice President (VP) of the Great Lakes Region in December. We held this election early so that newly elected VP can be part of the February circle meeting and also have time in the Spring to work with our current Great Lakes VP to gain experience in the role prior to assuming the office in the summer of '23. We've also moved forward on the election for the President of FCM in December with the same hope and purpose in mind.

We were all thankful to be together. Yet, it was much more powerful to be together face-to -face doing this work we value. This holds true for worship, family times and all gatherings of life. We value being together and should never take it for granted.

With 2023 on the horizon, I pray that our new normal will include more face-to-face time with one another; that the circle will gather both in February and July to move our organization forward in all its endeavors; that each of our VPs will deepen their relationships with the membership by holding gatherings and by being a resource to members in need; and that our faith communities will grow and that we will build up new ones.

I pray we will continue to give cheerfully to the endowment fund and that we can give from the overflow to ministries in need. I pray God will be with all of us every day.

## FCM Registry

### **New Process for FCM Sacramental Registry**

Beginning January 1, 2023 there is a new process for the FCM Sacramental Registry which will be used for Baptisms and Weddings. The Sacramental Registry will now be accessed through Realm. Steps to access the Sacramental Registry can be found below.

Members will complete a separate entry for each Baptism or Wedding.


As a reminder- All FCM members presiding at Baptisms must register the Baptism with FCM. We encourage you to register Weddings through the FCM registry in addition to following any state and local process required for your area.

### **Accessing the Sacramental Registry**

- Go to www.onrealm.org
- · Log into your Realm profile using your email address and password you created
- · Find and click on the "Events" tab on the left-hand side
- Find and click on the "FCM Baptismal Registry (2023)" or the "FCM Marriage Registry (2023)" event
- Click on the "Register By (Date)" button
- On the right hand side you will see a note that shows "Who is attending this event?".
   Ensure your name is checked and click "Next"
- Complete as much information as possible ensuring to enter information for all required fields indicated with a red \*
- Scroll back up to top right hand and click "Next"
- Review your information for accuracy
- Click on "Register" button
- · Repeat process if you have other sacraments to register

Some of you were kind enough to give a little of your time to go a step further and help me gather more information before reaching out to ACS Technologies (Realm) support team to problem-solve.

#### Speaking of Realm:

Logging in to Realm- When logging in to Realm, please make sure you are typing in www.onrealm.org directly into the address bar of the search engine you are using. It is important to not have any extra characters and that you do not use the search feature. Realm has informed me that this can cause issues.

#### Browser Compatibility/ Operating System Updates-

In order to experience full functionality in Realm it is important to maintain updated versions of your operating system and browsers. Not all browsers have the same capabilities and it is well documented that websites can work differently depending on the browser you are using. Not sure you're using the latest browser? Go to whatsmybrowser.org/ to find out. This will also tell you what operating system (i.e. Windows 10, etc.) you are using.

Here is a link from ASC Technologies (Realm) that provides additional information on Browser Compatibility if you are interested. help.acst.com

**Updated information**- Please make sure when any of your contact information changes that you make the appropriate changes in your Realm profile.

Passwords- If you have forgotten your password please click on the "Forgot your password?" and follow the steps to create a new password. We are not able to reset member passwords on our end.

Unsubscribe- There have been a number of members who have unsubscribed from Realm (either unintentionally or intentionally). Please give careful thought if you have been considering unsubscribing as you run the risk of not receiving important information from FCM. Our Constant Contact distribution list is periodically updated from our Realm database. Any person who unintentionally unsubscribed please contact me directly to initiate a resubscription.

If you are experiencing an issue related to Realm, I encourage you to reach out to me directly by phone or email.



## The story of Dignity Dayton, DBA The Living Beatitudes Community. Aka LBC

I want to begin by saying LBC is just one model of a "Faith Community"

Our Statement of Faith: Believing that the Beatitudes are the fullest expression of Jesus' teaching, the Living Beatitudes Community seeks to live this message through an Intentional Eucharistic Community. Our social and ecclesial diversity enhances our respect for each individual's spiritual journey. All persons of different faith traditions are welcome.

We seek the unity of all peoples and respect diverse sources of wisdom and spiritual inspiration. We believe there is more value in questioning than in absolute doctrines. We believe that Jesus gave us the example of a life lived for peace, inclusion, and justice. Through sharing liturgical life and mutual support for one another, our members are strengthened to live Beatitude-inspired lives dedicated to spiritual growth and social commitment.

### I would like to give you a bit of the history of our community

DaytonDignity, a chapter of DignityUSA, began in 1980. In the mid-80s they began meeting as a faith community on the 2nd and 4th Saturday of the month at Holy Trinity Catholic Church. The pastor of Holy Trinity led the service along with Marianist Priests from University of Dayton.

In 1992 DignityDayton sent a letter to the Archbishop urging him to take a stand in the church for samesex marriage. Two weeks after the Archbishop received DignityDayton's letter they were told they could no longer celebrate in the downtown Catholic church as long as they held that position on same-sex marriage.

Upon receiving that response from the archbishop, the community began to look elsewhere for a place to worship. DignityDayton moved to a local Episcopal Church on the west side of town and continued their gatherings on the 2nd and 4th Saturday evenings of the month, however, after a brief 10 month stay in that particular church, the Episcopal pastor gave them a letter, again requesting them to leave because of their stance on marriage. The good news is that DignityDayton was welcomed by Christ Episcopal Church in downtown Dayton and continued their services on the 2nd and 4th Saturdays of the month. The attendance at that time was approximately 10 to 15 people. Also at this time, they still had Marianist Priests from the University of Dayton leading their services. However, this would soon end.

In July 1994, I was a Catholic priest who then made the decision to marry my wife, Patty. I was invited by a member of the DignityDayton community to be a Presider. My wife and I began to celebrate with that community on the 2<sub>nd</sub> & 4th Saturday evenings. Once a month I presided over the service and a Marianist priest presided the other Saturday.

However, the winds were changing, and the Marianist leadership at that time began to tell their priests they could not lead services for this all gay and lesbian community. Richard Young, a gay Benedictine priest, and Michael Smith, a married gay priest, joined DaytonDignity and were invited to fill in for the Marianist who no longer served the community.

You might ask what happened on the 1st, 3rd and 5th Sundays of the month. Well, nothing... SO several of our group decided to gather in homes on those Sundays to hold our service. At first only 3 to 5 people attended. The host served breakfast after the service. Some attendees came from the DaytonDignity community and others came from the Catholic church where they no longer found a home. In many ways, you might say we were all church orphans. Our numbers grew so large, it was no longer possible to meet in member's homes. We did not have enough room, and feeding the continually growing group was difficult.

We held a "visioning day" for DignityDayton and the home church people, many of whom were the same people. We decided to gather as one community on a Sunday. On this visioning day, the name Living Beatitudes Community came into being.

The Living Beatitudes Community (LBC) began in 2003, and we also decided at that time to join FCM and become a FCM Faith Community. Three of our presiders at the time were FCM members.

Today we are officially DignityDayton DBA the Living Beatitudes Community. We have joined forces with Federation of Christian Ministries (FCM), Roman Catholic Women Priests (RCWP) and former members of St. Agnes parish to create an intentional eucharistic community.

Our current membership is approximately 90 with ages ranging from 24 – 85. Our average weekly attendance in services is 50 to 55 individuals in person and on Zoom. We have 5 presiders: a male married priest, a RCWP, a married woman presider whom we lifted up from the community, a gay married priest and an FCM commissioned minister.

We always have a member of the community copreside at each service. After each homily the community is invited to share their thoughts on the message. We have 14 different Eucharistic prayers that we have collected and re-written, all of which are focused on Creation theology and not sacrificial theology.

Because of our history we are a community very focused on social justice. We collaborate with Christ Episcopal Church on a number of community efforts.

#### **February**


Do we see eye to eye? Different generations have unique concepts of religion and spirituality. How can we minister across the spectrum of these generational views?

The Feast of Three Kings In this ancient ritual, write the following above the entrance door on the inside with chalk: 20+C+M+B+23. The three letters stand for the Latin: "Christus Mansionem Benedicat – May Christ bless this home." The legendary names of the three wise men, Casper, Melchior, and Balthasar, probably created because of the letters of the blessing. The numbers are the numbers of the year.

### **Home Blessing**

Loving God, Creator of the universe, bless this holy space, and all who enter and worship here.

Fill it with hope, peace, joy, love, and the Light of Christ.

May we put on, as God's chosen ones, holy and beloved,
heartfelt compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, and patience,
bearing with and forgiving one another.

And over all these may we put on love, that is the bond of perfection.

And let the peace of Christ rule our hearts.

Let the word of Christ dwell in us richly, with gratitude in our hearts to God.

Fill us with the light of Christ, that our love for each other may go out to all people, as we see the face of God in everyone, who enters here, and in all those we meet.

We ask this in the name of the Christ, the name that each of us bears, and from whose family we come, who calls us his sisters and brothers; and who lives and loves with you and the Holy Spirit, and in us, God forever and ever. Amen.



We are sadden by the news of the passing of the First President of the Federation of Christian Ministries

Eugene Carl Bianchi - Age 92 of Athens, Georgia May 5, 1930 - December 18, 2022 passed away on Sunday, December 18, 2022


### Eugene Bianchi (Professor Emeritus) Emory University.

With a B.A. & M.A. from Gonzaga University and a Ph.D. from Columbia University, Dr. Bianchi has taught at Emory since 1968. Among his books are Aging as a Spiritual Journey, 1982; A Democratic Catholic Church, 1992 (co-edited with Rosemary R. Ruether) and Elder Wisdom, 1994, The Hum of it All, 2019. He specialized in the spirituality of aging, Christian theology and institutional reform, as well as in transtraditional and ecological spirituality. He published, lectured and conducted workshops on these topics.

### FIRST PRESIDENT of SPFM/FCM

Eugene Bianchi 1969 - 1971

I've been asked by Antoinette Marold to reflect in a personal way on my memories of being in the original group of founders. Much of our early history is covered in William Power's *Free Priests* (1992). Also Bill Manseau recently sent out a CD of our earliest documents. And I wrote a memoir *Taking a Long Road Home* (2011) that covers my first involvement with SPFM.

My first Ah-Ha experience about all this was on a bus trip from Manhattan to Gettysburg College in Pennsylvania to give a talk on ecumenism in 1966. I was a young Jesuit priest finishing up doctoral work at Columbia and Union Theological Seminary and serving as an assistant editor of *America*. I was reading Will Herberg's *Protestant*, *Catholic*, *Jew* when I had a "vision" that actually moved me emotionally. Yes, quiet tears. Vatican II had ended only a year before and many windows seemed to be opening. I imagined starting a new kind of religious order. Others had done it. Why not me? This order would have men and women working together equally in the spirit of the Gospel. It would be made up of married priests and lay people without the divisions of clericalism.

For the next two years, I taught religious studies at Santa Clara University in California. During that time I had more contacts with Protestant friends at Stanford like Robert McAfee Brown, John Duryea, the Catholic pastor at St. Anne's Parish in Palo Alto and others in campus ministry there like Methodist Barbara Troxell and Donna Myers Ambrogi who would soon marry Tom Ambrogi, a Jesuit theologian and friend. In San Jose I got to know the Grail community and its women ministers, especially Marie Mohr (now Grandstaff) who worked with me to set up a Center for the Study of Contemporary Values at SCU.

The period of the late Sixties and early Seventies was a major transition time for priests and nuns who were wondering about their traditional vocations and new options. Many wanted to continue some form of ministerial service but not necessarily as celibates. For example, the woman who would become my first wife left her order with five others to form a community of their own, called Fides. By 1967 I was questioning the soundness of religious life for me. Another Ah-Ha experience was seeing an older priest in cassock and biretta reading his breviary on the way to breakfast on a foggy morning. I had a powerful sense that I could not or even should not be doing that when his age.

Among the reasons for leaving the Jesuits and the clerical priesthood that I shared in writing with friends was wanting to pioneer new ways of living as a priest. My early

thoughts were to keep on saying Mass and doing other pastoral things even though the official church would disapprove. No doubt the bold spirit of the times was at work in civil rights and women's movements. Acting outside the rules could be interpreted as a kind of civil disobedience and a following of one's conscience. Soon I would write an article in *Commonweal* along these lines; I also developed a column in *The National Catholic Reporter* that kept progressive themes alive.

I heard about the meetings in St. Louis in 1967 that were agitating for some kind of organization of former priests. I can't remember my first meeting with Tom Durkin, a married priest from Philadelphia, who would become the first secretary of SPFM. Tom did very important communication work for the group in its first period. I probably met Tom in the California Bay Area where he and Gail had moved. After our wedding in July 1969, Cathryn and I flew to Boston to pick up my car which had been driven there by a former nun friend from Atlanta. In Dorchester we met Bill and Mary Manseau. Bill was and has remained a remarkable leader in SPFM/FCM, and Corpus. Shortly after we met Gerry and Marita Grudzen in Yonkers; the latter have been well-known, creative persons in FCM.

I recall the organizing meeting in Detroit organized by Pat Best, where I was chosen as President of SPFM and Rocco Caporale became Vice President. Rocco was an Italian Jesuit who taught Sociology at St. John's University in New York City. Rocco was spirited and very capable with a broader view of the Catholic Church. He would eventually marry an actress in NYC. Our main meeting that year was our first convention in a church renewal center in Washington, D.C. I wrote a vision statement for that event which still seems to read well in Bill Power's book, pp. 50-51.

In 1969 at the Washington meeting, we were thinking in daring ways, but not as broadly as we would understand ourselves a few years later when we explicitly opened the movement to women ministers and began the certifying process. In D.C. one could sense the growing exodus of priests from clerical structures, many of them marrying and most looking for jobs. So the first SPFMers had their hands full. Some had difficult issues with their families of origin. Yet stirring new thought was going on at Catholic U with Charles Curran losing his professorship over his stance on birth control. In this context, I wrote:

"The members of the Society understand themselves as living in the historical tradition of Catholicism. They do not separate themselves from this church, but rather they desire to serve humanity through their church tradition in new and creative ways. In a time of ....transition....the Society intends to be a source of fraternal support and inspiration to priests, particularly those who elect to minister outside official structures."

Two things were clear at this time. We still thought of ourselves as married and unmarried Catholic priests. We were hoping to open dialogue with bishops and other Catholic organizations. We did have a few meetings with a bishops committee at a national episcopal gathering as well as with the superiors of religious orders of men.

Most of us conducted liturgies in homes and performed other clerical services. I spoke about our movement to the Catholic Theological Society of America and to a national meeting of priests councils, led by Frank Bonnike who would soon leave and marry. On Long Island I met with Cardinal Suenens of Belgium who was one of the great progressives of Vatican II who was sympathetic to a married priesthood. We should also note that when a long range history of all this is written in the future, a time when the RCC will have both married priests and women priests, SPFM will be seen as an inspirational first for all subsequent groups not only in the U.S. but in the world.

We knew that such a major change in the RCC would be an uphill slog. Yet the period of Paul VI was closer to Vatican II and less rigid in its opposition. Vatican II-type bishops were still serving many dioceses. Under John Paul II and Benedict a much more conservative episcopate would dominate the church. A litmus test for becoming a bishop consisted of absolute obedience to the Vatican on all teachings. Another aspect of this opposition came from our original religious orders. We had broken ranks and gone off on our own while giving up on celibacy. In those early years of the exodus, we were often enough seen as quitters or renegades or givers of scandal to the faithful. This attitude would gradually change over the years with our orders of origin even though the official church hardened its opposition. Lay people and nuns were much more openminded toward "defectors." Nuns have been leading the church in the Gospel spirit for a long time. Certainly since Vatican II.

Here I want to mention someone who was at the Washington meeting and became a great supporter of both SPFM/FCM and later Corpus: Mary Lou Zefuss. Mary Lou was a loveable, bright "original" from the Pittsburgh area who had happy and unhappy experiences with priests in her life. Another very important person in the early movement was Joe Burns, a priest from Brooklyn, whom I may have met in these earliest encounters, but I clearly recall him and wife Audrey at the Berkeley convention in 1970. Joe would serve as secretary after Tom Durkin and also as Vice President. I also remember Vicki and Romeo Di Benedetto at the latter meeting while on their honeymoon. They had also attended the first convention in Washington in 1969. Romeo became a minister at large for the organization and publisher of the SPFM newsletter, "Diaspora," while Rocco Caporale was its first editor.

The earliest years of SPFM/FCM combined hope for serious renewal of ministry with many moments of discouragement. The first members were relatively young priests setting out on major changes of direction. They were marrying and seeking employment with very limited resources. They were starting to raise families. They faced opposition from the official church and sometimes from their own families. When I think back on it, I'm amazed that our group lasted as long as it has, and has changed over the years to better meet new challenges. Two other pioneers in the movement are Charley Sullivan and Pauline Fox. Charley was a priest from Alabama who travelled with Pauline to the first convention in D.C. They volunteered to act as ambassadors at large, driving their old camper around the country and living in great simplicity. They have also spent much of their lives in prison ministry and peace movements.

SPFM/FCM was blessed with leaders who picked up the baton, as it were, when the first leaders were flagging in energy. So it was that Bernie McGoldrick was elected second president for the 1971-73 term. He and wife Cappy attended the Berkeley convention in 1970. Bernie, a former Jesuit and professor of Political Science at Fresno State University, shifted the group's attention from theological considerations to ways of understanding and implementing political change in the church. He also wanted to enlarge the movement in international ways. William Powers called McGoldrick's effort as an attempt at "political convergence," trying to rally groups with similar interests for renewal to act more cohesively.


To my mind, the most important transition in the life of SPFM/FCM happened in 1973 on Staten Island when Bill Manseau and Gerry Grudzen became president and vice president of the organization. The name change to FCM signified an ever broader grasp of ecumenical ministry beyond the RCC and welcomed women to every form of ministry. It signaled also the beginning of our certification program for ministers. Our organization could be seen as a precursor of today's women's ordination movement in the RCC.

Now in my eighties, I feel privileged to have been part of our movement and I have been blessed by it both as a teacher of religious studies at Emory University and in the development of my own spirituality. The latter is expressed in my book of poems, "Ear to the Ground: Poems from the Long View" that will appear shortly. The intellectual and pastoral concerns of FCM are expressed in the poems that often do not use traditionally religious language. Spirituality, east and west, and in nature of which we are a part, is suffused with Spirit waiting to be experienced in our joys and sorrows.

FCM member Ginny Cusack receives "Wisdom of the Elders Award" from Montessori accreditation organization



On Thursday evening December 8 the Montessori Accreditation Council for Teacher Education (MACTE) bestowed their Wisdom of the Elders Award on Northeast Region member Ginny Cusack. Her own words will explain her work and commitment to help the Montessori education philosophy spread, both in the US and especially to now war-torn Ukraine. Her statement reads:

Montessori training changed my life. Implementing the Montessori philosophy in various settings became my passion and thus my life's most rewarding work. My dream of starting an all-day, year-round Montessori school in Princeton NJ became a reality in 1980. My favorite responsibility was working with new teachers. That love motivated me to be a field consultant and a Montessori coordinator for magnet schools in Yonkers, New York. A crucial opportunity to continue what I love came when Marsha Stencel, head of Princeton Montessori School, asked me to start a teacher training center, Princeton Center for Teacher Education (PCTE) on the site of the school. I enjoyed the creativity of writing the AMS infant toddler and early childhood curriculum, training instructors, enrolling students, and acquiring MACTE accreditation. Soon after, I wrote the EL I and II programs [Elementary Level], and eventually the administrators' course as well. Throughout this process I partnered with Marsha, and we created a remarkable and rewarding synergy between us.

Marsha and I, with three Ukrainian educators, became a formidable time team to lead the American Ukrainian Montessori Project beginning in 1994 and remaining active today, despite the war. The PCTE community helped to train Ukrainian teachers, create a model school, travel to Kyiv, give teacher workshops, assist in establishing the Ukrainian Montessori teacher training Center [UMC] and the Ukrainian Montessori Association, and develop its initial administrators' course. Seeing Montessori education flourish throughout regions of Ukraine has been the highlight of my career. It was and is a journey of collaboration and bonding, challenges and success within a community of friendship and love for which I am most grateful.

Currently I serve as UMC accreditation coordinator, USA; and after receiving my Georgetown University Certificate of Leadership Coaching, I coach Montessori leaders and volunteers as a mentor in the [American Montessori Society Emerging Leadership Fellowship] AMS ELF program.

Congratulations, Ginny, from FCM on making a difference in hundreds of lives.

### **Regional Reconfiguration**


