


### VICE PRESIDENT, SOUTH CENTRAL REGION

# He is the Prince of Peace...Uh, not so much

When the risen Jesus came into the locked room where the disciples were, he said to them, "Peace be with you." (cf. John 20) This was his first comment to his disciples, so we can stipulate that this is pretty important to him and his mission. We get to some deep problems, however, when we look at the historical record of how those who claim to be his followers have done in regard to espousing and supporting peace on earth. One of the Crusades, aiming to expel Muslims from the Holy Land, took the opportunity to pillage the city of their Christian brethren, Constantinople. In fact, we see centuries of bitter conflict and war in Europe as new interpretations of Scripture and church power were brought forth during the Reformation. These wars are all Christian-on-Christian violence. In WWII we have an ostensibly Christian nation, Germany, bringing havoc and destruction on all of its neighbors and attempting to exterminate our predecessors in faith, the Jews. Today we have Russia, a "Christian" nation, raining death and distraction on its neighbor Ukraine. What's our response to all this violence as members of FCM, who often are commissioned ministers of the Christ?

What I suggest to influence our country and world toward peace, is for each of us to write one letter per month to our elected representatives. This letter would come from your perception of how life could be peaceful in our world and in our country, if the government official made changes in law and practice to the peaceful pursuits you suggest. Write the letter to your representative in Congress. Then send an exact copy addressed to each of your two senators. Make yourself, a person of faith in the Prince of Peace, a presence in your elected representatives' awareness. Drip on them. We may not be able to establish peace on earth, but we may be able to influence the leaders of our government to place a higher value on aspects of life that are highlighted by our FCM Mission Statement, our Vision Statement, and our Core Values of Belonging, Compassion, Empowerment, Equity, and Mindful Living. https://www.federationofchristianministries.org/index.html Consider making them part of yourself.

My closing comments are to encourage you to increase your conscious involvement with FCM ever so slightly.

Our group of Regional Vice Presidents is strongly taking steps to understand and do their jobs more efficiently and better. Their efforts will affect all of our involvements in FCM as a community. Consider reaching out to your Regional Vice President and offering your help to them.

All members, please make it a point to attend the **FCM Prayer Gathering** on a quarterly basis. In this way you can dip into the spirituality of your peers in ministry. Invitations are sent to you from Realm weekly for this spiritual exercise.

If I can be of assistance to you regarding Realm related matters, please do not hesitate to reach out to me by email or phone.

### **Updated Information**

Spring for many people brings Spring cleaning. Please make sure that you update any relevant information in your Realm profile. You can do so by logging in and at the top right-hand corner click on the drop-down arrow next to your name and then click on "My Profile" and "Edit Profile". After making any changes be sure to "Save".

### Realm Log-in and 2 Step Verification

As with many software programs and platforms you may have noticed Realm has implanted new security measures. For additional information regarding this use this link Realm Sign In

When logging in to Realm, please make sure you are typing in <a href="www.onrealm.org">www.onrealm.org</a> directly into the address bar of the search engine you are using. It is important to not have any extra characters and that you do not use the search feature.

**Passwords-** We are unable to reset member passwords on our end. If you have forgotten your password please go to the log in screen and click on the "Forgot your password?" and follow the steps to create a new password. The new password will go to the email address that is your account email in Realm. If you are uncertain which email is your account email please reach out to me.

Browser Compatibility/ Operating System Updates- In order to experience full functionality in Realm it is important to maintain updated versions of your operating system and browsers. Not all browsers have the same capabilities and it is well documented that websites can work differently depending on the browser you are using. Not sure you're using the latest browser? Go to <a href="whatsmybrowser.org/">whatsmybrowser.org/</a> to find out. This will also tell you what operating system (i.e. Windows 10, etc.) you are using.

**Unsubscribe**- I can relate to the fact that many of you are bombarded with vast amounts of emails, some of which are quite unwanted. Sometimes, members in their efforts to cut down on the emails they receive inadvertently unsubscribe or mark emails as abusive. At times, FCM members have unsubscribed from Realm (either unintentionally or intentionally). Please give careful thought if you have been considering unsubscribing as you run the risk of not receiving important information from FCM. Our Constant Contact distribution list is periodically updated from our Realm database. Any person who unintentionally unsubscribed please contact me directly to initiate a resubscription as Realm requires me to get your permission to initiate a resubscription.

### **New Process for FCM Sacramental Registry**

A new process for the FCM Sacramental Registry which is used for Baptisms and Weddings. The Sacramental Registry will now be accessed through Realm. Steps to access the Sacramental Registry can be found below.

Members will complete a separate entry for each Baptism or Wedding.

As a reminder- All FCM members presiding at Baptisms must register the Baptism with FCM. We encourage you to register Weddings through the FCM registry in addition to following any state and local process required for your area.

### Accessing the Sacramental Registry

- Go to <u>www.onrealm.org</u>
- Log into your Realm profile using your email address and password you created
- Find and click on the "Events" tab on the left-hand side
- Find and click on the "FCM Baptismal Registry (2023)" or the "FCM Marriage Registry (2023)" event
- Click on the "Register By (Date)" button
- On the right hand side you will see a note that shows Who is attending this event?".
  - Ensure your name is checked and click "Next"
- Complete as much information as possible ensuring to enter information for all required fields indicated with a red \*
- Scroll back up to top right hand and click "Next"
- Review your information for accuracy
- Click on "Register" button
- Repeat process if you have other sacraments to register

# The Gift That Keeps On Giving


A member recently asked a good question, "Where does FCM's grant money come from?". Answer: There are two sources of funding supporting the grant program. Dollars set aside in the overall organizational budget, AND interest income realized from FCM's Endowment Fund.

Part of the Endowment Fund's mission is to raise donation capital that supports and sustains FCM's membership growth and operations; and provide specific types of support that extend FCM's mission, such as grants. Once the endowment fund is mature enough, investment returns generated may be distributed, thus leaving the principal to continue to grow. A widely used practice by nonprofits, faith-based organizations, educational entities, private and public foundations, and the corporate world. Many of the grants available come from such funds.

Just as our goal is to use our money and resources wisely, FCM takes seriously its covenant to manage FCM funding similarly. As the Endowment fund grows, so does FCM's capacity to strengthen and expand its distribution such as grant funding. I have seen first-hand how the grant program has extended FCM's mission and values in the public sphere via the various vibrant programs and initiatives awarded funding.

That is why I chose to donate to the FCM's endowment fund. I consider my donation not only a wise investment in FCM, but also a means to support FCM members and the diverse and dynamic ministries they represent. I hope that this year if you haven't already, you will consider contributing to the Endowment Fund. I found signing up via Realm to give monthly to be the easiest way to contribute. # FC/M Faith Community Spotlight BY JUDY LORENZ, FCM





### Sophia Inclusive Catholic Community





As a member of FCM's Faith Communities Committee, I am learning about the different communities within the FCM organization. Last month I had the pleasure of meeting Bobbi Boyle and Joe Pilewski of The Sophia Inclusive Catholic Community, based in Northern New Jersey. I found the group in our FCM listing of Faith Communities and my inner Jersey girl led me to contact them first. I'm so glad I did!

I contacted the Sophia Community Presider, Mike Corso. He directed me to two individuals in order to get folks who became part of the community at different times - each with unique perspectives.

The three of us joined in a shared zoom call and they took turns answering my questions. When I inquired as to how long they have been a part of Sophia, Bobbie said that she was a member of the community before it was a community! She had been active in the Newman Center in college, and searched for progressive parishes that were responsive to the calls of Vatican II. She and her husband Bernie became Third order Franciscans and were active at Christ House in New Jersey which later became Sunrise House.

### Sophia Inclusive Catholic Community

Bobbi and Bernie had a number of like-minded friends, so they decided to become the structural changes they wanted to see in the Church. Bobbi realized that she should not be seeking validation of her relationship with God from others or authority figures. "Find God that resides within You and travel with him," is her motto.

And so, she and her friends started meeting monthly as a group discussing theology and spirituality and it went on for twenty years! One of those folks was a woman named Mary Ann Schoettly who one day unexpectedly announced that she was going to become a Roman Catholic Woman Priest. She followed her heart and upon ordination, along with the original group, she brought in people who had followed her in her journey and others interested in finding a new type of liturgy. In 2009 they gathered in her home as Woman Priest, Mary Ann, became the Presider of the Sophia Catholic Inclusive Community.

Joe Pilewski, on the other hand, has been a part of Sophia for the past seven years. He was a cradle Catholic and has never ever missed going to Mass on Sunday. But, it was of the obligatory nature. His ideology was to find the quickest Mass and get himself in and out with as little fanfare as possible. But one day he happened upon a lecture given by theologian/author, Michael Morwood. Joe was greatly moved by Michael's perspective on faith and its relation to the cosmos, the earth we inhabit, and the universe! Soon after, he heard about Sophia from a Marriage Encounter friend. Joe and his wife gave it a try. No more in and out. This group started at 10 a.m. and ended at 1 p.m. After two experiences, they were hooked! This was community. This was it! Or at least the Roman Catholic Church that he had been experiencing in his life thus far, was definitely not it.

So, what is it about small faith communities that work? What inspires people to go? To continue going? What do folks enjoy most about it? What is its purpose?

Joe really enjoys the time before the liturgy. Folks get updated on what is happening in life and there is connection. He also recognizes that the community is gifted with many working together to create beautiful liturgies. Bobbi says it's sharing in our humanity. The sense of community is what makes them unique. It is open, developing and growing in wisdom, attitude and knowledge.

Joe also mentioned the social justice aspect of the community. The community hosts several presentations throughout the year. Coming soon will be a visit from "Nuns on the Bus" speaking on wealth and inequality.

Bobbi speaks of the Sophia Catholic Inclusive Community as a place where you can travel along on your path to God. It does not have to match anyone else's path. "I cannot imagine my life without this community. It helps us in trying to replicate the life of the man/person, Jesus."

I would like to thank **Mike Corso** for introducing me to Bobbi and Joe. I hope their experiences will inspire you to join or form a community near you. Or, you can join the Sophia group who meet weekly via zoom by emailing Mike: <a href="mailto:corso\_mike@yahoo.com">corso\_mike@yahoo.com</a>


### Beliefs from the Sophia website:

Roots: Our roots are Catholic. However, our liturgy has changed and adapted in our 14 years. We are grounded in the Holy Spirit, so that <u>all</u> are welcome to celebrate with us. No one is "out" and no one is "in." We are one. Our theology flows from Sophia, Wisdom of God, as recognized in the Hebrew Testament.

**Vision:** We are an alternative Community which is a safe spiritual home for all. Our community and our actions are rooted in the Gospel values of love, compassion, inclusivity, diversity, peace and justice seen in the mission and ministry of Jesus.

Mission: We are creating and practicing new ways of being Church through a discipleship of equals – carrying out the priesthood of the people through radical inclusivity in joyful worship and ministry. Each person's uniqueness is honored and offered as gift to the community.

### Then, Behold, the Veil of the Temple Was Torn in Two From Top to Bottom. Matthew 27:51 (NKJV)

I have frequently pondered the significance of this passage. Some contend that it reports an historical fact. Some believe that it dramatically represents the termination of the First Covenant - this curtain that traditionally separated the Ark of the Covenant from the ordinary people.

I believe that it indicates that there is no longer a veil (a separation) between the Sacred and the Secular. As Jesus' Blood penetrated the earth, everything became (or always was, for the One who transcended time) Sacred and was so declared.

The primary task of a priest/spiritual leader is to remind us that:

All food and drink are holy.

The community of believers is holy.

The table is sacred.

Creation itself is sacred.

The duty of the presbyter is not to re-consecrate what has already been made holy. S(he) is to bring people to an awareness that everything is already consecrated. Food and drink. Humanity. The table. All creation.

At the Last Supper, Jesus announced, "This is my body. This is the cup of my blood." He did not say, "I am taking unleavened bread and am changing it into my body." He was recognizing something that was already true: that when we eat and drink, we share the body and blood of the Christ.

One can also imagine him looking into the eyes of his disciples while saying, "This is my body, my blood."

It is the duty of the presbyter to re-enact this and then send us home to do the same - around our tables, together with our domestic churches. To share Communion with each other.

And if this Communion is the Body of the Christ, then it is important for us to define what "Body of Christ" means.

Does it mean the community? Does it mean the Body of Jesus on the Cross? Does it mean the Christ, alive in Glory? Does it mean the Mystical Body of Christ (us), now one with the Divine?

This requires conversation and clarification. Do I hear any voices?

The first disciples of Jesus kept Him alive by praying together, sharing a table meal and eating together, and by finding Him in each other.


We are called upon to do the same. Nothing more. Nothing less.

Grace and Peace Southwest Region!


