# A Word From The Chairperson

As I had mentioned in the last Newsletter we would continue to discuss what we need to do as a Convention of Churches to be relevant in a very volatile political world. I want to emphasize the importance of talking to people who are of a differing opinion on issues. We need to connect especially with those with whom we disagree. Please see aditional link to this site in the newsletter Constant Contact Quick Links. I would also like to call your attention to a book written by Ralph Dull, "Nonviolence Is Not For Wimps". Ralph speaks of the power and struggles of following the way on nonviolence in a violent world.

In the last Newsletter, I suggested that you might want to put your state and federal representatives and senators on your speed dials. I cannot stress enough that we need to be talking to our federal and state representatives because they work for us. If you do not know it is easy to find out. Text your zip code to 520-200-2223 and you will get your information back immediately. Give it a try.

In this issue, I wish to raise an important question. Do we as believer and as a Convention of Churches need to be concerned about the federal budget? It is often said, you can tell your priorities by how you spend your money. If this has any truth, then the 2017 and 2018 Federal budget proposals being discussed right now are of consequence.

Did you know that "The U.S. outpaces all other nations in military expenditures? World military spending totaled more than \$1.6 trillion in 2015. The U.S. accounted for **37 percent** of the total. U.S. military expenditures are roughly the size of the **next seven largest military budgets** around the world, combined." These countries in order of spending are; China, Saudi Arabia, Russia, United Kingdom, India, France and Japan. "U.S. military spending dwarfs the budget of the #2 country — China. For every dollar China spends on its military, the U.S. spends \$2.77." (Information found in the National Priorities Project.).

The President is proposing an increase of 9% in the military budget while cutting the State Department 32% which does much peace making work throughout the world. Military Generals have said that for every dollar spent in the State Department (soft power) that is one less dollar I need to spend on military equipment (hard power). Another cut in the budget is the Environmental Protection Agency, 31%. These cuts are of concern.

The administration also proposed a \$363 million cut in the United States Agency for International Development's "Food for Peace" program, which provides food assistance in poor countries. The proposed cuts come as famine threatens four African and Middle Eastern countries simultaneously – Yemen, South Sudan, Somalia and Nigeria.

The proposal includes a reduction of \$1.5 billion from the Housing and Urban Development Department's Community Development Block Grant program, which the Trump administration proposed eliminating in its fiscal 2018 budget.

The White House also proposes eliminating almost all funding for the AmeriCorps State and National program, cutting \$377 million from the \$385 million appropriation. Many of these cuts are to offset the increases in military spending.

These proposed increases and cuts in our National Budget are frightening to me. I am deeply concerned and anxious about the direction of our country. I worry about how they will affect millions of people around the world and not just in our country.

I believe as people of Faith we need to speak out about the way the federal government is spending our money. The values of nonviolence and peace are values we profess as people of faith. Pope Francis reminds us that in any social and civil contest authentic Christianity..."does not create walls, but builds bridges....one who creates walls in not Christian....this is not the Gospel." I believe the same applies to a country and the people who live in that country cannot continue to build military resources while decreasing resources of peace cannot claim to be a Christian nation.

It may be trite to use the saying WWJD (What Would Jesus Do). Would Jesus call us to increase the military spending while cutting humanitarian funds?

As people of faith we need to speak out on issues. We need to come together talk with each other especially those with whom we disagree. Use the methods of Nonviolent Communication in conversations across party lines.

- Remain objective. Judgmental or demonizing statements get us nowhere.
- 2. Seek to understand the feelings and not the issues. Clearly describe your own emotions rather than your policy positions.
- 3. Identify the needs. Our feelings are all connected to our unmet needs.
- Make requests and not demands. There is a time in any conversation to ask for concrete actions to satisfy the needs.

I ask you to stay in contact with your congressman and senators and talk to them about your concerns. Our FCM Mission speaks of inclusion of all people. I ask you to talk to people who have different views than you and listen to them. This is an effort to speak and live the values of Jesus. It is an effort to live nonviolence as Jesus lived.

Thank you for allowing me the opportunity to serve you for three additional years as your president (July, 2017 to July, 2020). That I can continue in this position makes me very happy. There are challenges to confront and work to do, of course. Knowing just a little of my background will enable you to understand this positive feeling I have.

I was ordained a Catholic priest in May 1971, forty six years ago. After about two years, I had the great benefit of being at the right place and the right time to meet and quickly marry my wife, **Ginny**. That great action moved me out of my religious leadership job before I had much of a chance to get settled in. I was very green. I entered the insurance business "temporarily" in 1973, and have just ended that temporary assignment this January... a short span of 44 years. But it was by entering and becoming involved with FCM (2000) that I became able to exercise some of the religious leadership for which I studied.

Now I hope to affect FCM in the following ways going forward.

**First,** I hope to encourage among our individual members greater awareness of their *friendship* possibilities with other FCM members. We are a group who seem to walk the walk of Christianity more than talking about it and splitting doctrinal hairs. This makes us a unique type of religious body. Many of our members found that their presentation of lifestyles and beliefs were not accepted by the Christian denominations in which they had matured. FCM continues to offer a welcoming community for all. I am proud to continue to encourage these connections and this welcoming visage.

We define ourselves as a *convention of churches* to the broader community. This self-understanding indicates our need.

**Second,** to pursue a variety of *new activities to support and give birth to faith communities*. This is a challenging arena for any group that calls itself Christian. We know that all of the major and mainline denominations are shrinking in their numbers of adherents. People describe themselves as spiritual and not religious. Given the depth of our members' study and experience it seems to me that FCM could begin controlled experiments with new forms of community which deal with values and experiences without preconceptions of what a contemporary Christian community might look like. I hope to encourage systematic thinking to attempt to address this challenge.


We live in an era of vast changes, affecting every aspect of our lives with more to come. Climate change confronts us as we see its effects from droughts, such as that which has affected Syria and its beleaguered population. We see its effects in the significant melting of glaciers and the Greenland and Antarctic ice caps. We have a hard time dealing with such massive and slowly encroaching change.

**Third,** I hope to have official FCM positions develop in response to societal issues that affect us all. For example, we are confronting the very real possibility of nuclear war on the Korean Peninsula. There a ruthless regime builds nuclear and missile capabilities as fast as it can. Now confronting that situation, our new president issues threats and moves warships toward this volatile area. When sabers rattle, bad for things can easily happen.

On April 6, 1917, 100 years ago, the United States entered World War I. It was a major and devastating war begun on the slimmest provocations. On April 6, 2017, the United States launched 59 cruise missiles against a Syrian air base. This shows us how easily war-circumstances can expand their grip. With North Korea we have a nuclear armed and radical regime, desperate to maintain its own power. Will contemporary provocations escalate to a nuclear war? We must *pray* they do not. And then we must *do those actions* within our system of government which might deflect this possibility of nuclear war. Write to President Trump and your members of Congress as the religious leaders you are. Members of Congress hold the power to declare war under our Constitution, and the president does not. Congress must control this Korean nuclear question with debate from all sides. We must not repeat Hiroshima and Nagasaki.

Challenges like these require action on our part which flows from a deepening spiritual experience. So I hope to continue to encourage FCM to devote more systematic time to prayer and meditation. From this deepening spiritual awareness actions will flow from us that are Spirit-guided and which will have good results. Specifically, please continue or begin a daily exercise of 2 X 2 4 FCM (two minutes of prayer and meditation daily for the benefit of FCM). In addition each Tuesday add Tuesday 10 4 FCM (10 minutes of prayer and meditation for the benefit of FCM). Thank you for being on the FCM journey. For the many who build FCM, thank you. For those who are involved in other ministerial activities, please consider carving out some time to build FCM. Blessings and hope to us all.

# Negotiating the Narrow Places

As a hospital chaplain, one of the many things I appreciate about my work is that every morning, we in the Spiritual Care Department gather for morning devotion time. This week, Jennifer, one of our Clinical Pastoral Education Residents offered a reflection based on the Passover Seder she participated in recently. She shared that through the Passover story, Seder guests were reminded about the Israelites' escape from Egypt.

The Hebrew name for Egypt is "Mitzrayim," and in her reflection Jennifer stated that in Judaism, Mitzrayim has been connected with the word meitzar (מצימ), meaning "sea strait", possibly alluding to narrow gulfs from both sides of the Sinai Peninsula. It can also mean "boundaries, limits, restrictions" or "narrow place." As she shared this, Jennifer invited us to reflect on the restricting, narrow places in our lives. What is it within ourselves that may be limiting our ability to move into freedom, she asked?

As I journey through spring, I've decided that I want to let Jennifer's question guide me in this season. Spring is a time that brings forth new life and growth. Perhaps there are ways I can grow that I'm not even fully aware of because of limiting ideas or fears that are holding me back. I was also thinking of this in the context of who we are as the Federation of Christian Ministries. As a community of faith, we often empower people to move out of tight, narrow and restrictive places and into freedom and new life. We speak up for justice and denounce those who would place limits and restrictions on who is welcome and who is included.

I am deeply grateful to be a part of the FCM community as we continue to live into the Freedom of Passover, and as we strive to move beyond the narrow places and limiting restrictions that keep us in bondage.

Chaplain's First Response



Being chaplain for first responders is unlike chaplaincy in other areas. Theology isn't the main subject, and rarely have I been questioned about my belief system or any other. Being both a chaplain and a first responder has been a double blessing—I am already a part of the strong brother and sisterhood in a "family" that is highly diverse, perhaps slightly dysfunctional, and full of humor, often dark humor.

The Fire Department, like the Police Department, forms ties that are most often built on high stress. We all depend on each other in dangerous, uncommon and sometimes funny situations. And when I'm not being an EMT? They know, all of them, that I am a phone call away. Sometimes there are 'bad' calls, and once the situation is resolved, steam is released in ways that often are not discernible right away.

So I listen to the radio when I am at home, and if I hear that there may be a need for my presence, I respond. If I don't respond, I go to the station and await the crew's return. I watch and I listen. I watch for signs that perhaps a call has left one of them hurting, or angry, or signs that they are burying their pain in order to not appear "weak" in the eyes of their brothers and sisters. I make certain that I find a way to spend some alone time with them, talking, playing a video game, cooking together.— I even go target practicing with them. And I am always there to listen, or to sit in silence. I believe they all know that. Just listening is the most important part I play.

# Crystal-like Clarity

I remember the visit with crystal-like clarity. I was a resident at Methodist Hospital in suburban Minneapolis, and it was my weekend for on-call rotation. My wife Mayme and I were out grocery shopping (within the 30-minute response window of course), and my pager went off. It was near the end of the day, and this was the first time I had been paged all weekend. A patient had been admitted to the ICU (which along with the ER happened to be my unit during my residency) shortly after giving birth. We didn't have time to drop off my wife at home, and so she came to the hospital with me to wait it out in my office. When I arrived in the ICU, I discovered that the patient had a very difficult delivery (her twin babies were fine, thankfully) and was fighting for her life.


With the patient intubated and sedated, my primary focus became her husband and other family. I stayed with them for a while and took my leave when it seemed as though they had reached some semblance of equilibrium and peace. Mayme and I headed home, and my pager didn't go off again for the rest of the weekend. I didn't sleep well that evening. I didn't sleep well the night after either. Near the end of the week, it was my turn to present a verbatim (remember those?!?) At a loss for any other recent visits of substance I submitted the ICU call I had received over the weekend. The interaction seemed to be pretty cut and dry. I wasn't expecting much in the way of learning from my peers.

A wry smile has probably overtaken your face at this point because I'd bet you know what's coming. As it turns out, my issues sleeping that week had nothing to do with our new pillows. It turns out that as I sat in that hospital room with the patient, her husband, and their family, I saw my wife lying in that hospital bed. I was the husband. I realized that the patient and her husband were the same age as Mayme and I. In fact, we had just recently been discussing our plans for growing our own small family. I came to recognize all of this and its impact upon me as my cohort, and I discussed the verbatim. I further came to realize that I had even abandoned the patient's husband (conversationally & emotionally) at one point during my visit. I had quickly pivoted away from a line of discussion that had brought the whole situation to close to home for me

I found myself thinking anew of this story the other day as my wife, and I were discussing our daughter who is to be bom later this summer. I began thinking about the ways in which we as chaplains are called to stand both together and apart from those we minister to. We chaplains are able to do this beautiful work because we are skilled in ways that allow us to enter in with people during their deepest pain while at the same time not becoming enmeshed in that pain. As with any other skill, there was a time when we all learned how to hone our skills. Back in my residency days, I had much to learn (I still do!) You would think that as the days grow nearer to my own child's birth, stories like this would grip me with increasing anxiety. In reality, they don't.

These types of stories remind me that everything is learning. Every circumstance is an opportunity to expand my awareness, my empathy, and my love. Every circumstance is an opportunity for trust and perseverance. Everything is an opportunity to bring more Shalom into the world. An opportunity to stay firmly planted with another person in their pain and to let them know that they are never alone. To let them know that they are loved. This is a chaplain's work. This is my work.





Ginny Cusack is an executive coach who works with people to identify their leadership strengths and challenges, perfect their leadership style, set goals for themselves and their institution, make positive changes, and remove any barriers that prevent them from realizing their highest potential. Previously, Ginny served as director of Princeton Center for Teacher Education, Princeton, NJ, for 17 years. She received her coaching certificate from Georgetown University and did her Enneagram training with Don Riso, which she incorporates in her coaching. Ginny has a BA in Education and an MA in Theology from New Brunswick Theological Seminary. She was one of the first Catholic women to take CPE training in Madison, WI in 1969.

She is the director of The Deeper Connection, a ministry that teaches and nurtures contemplative spirituality through centering prayer meetings, workshops, cd's and contemplative worship.



Joanne Blaney - She has made presentations on Restorative Justice at conferences in Northern Ireland, U.S., Australia and Brazil. She presented her work on ESPERE - Conflict and Peacemaking at the International Congress of World Religions in Australia in 2009. # Resiliency in Ministry

"...they who wait for the Lord shall renew their strength; they shall mount up with wings like eagles; they shall run and not be weary; they shall walk and not faint." Isaiah 40:31

There are two events that are the impetus of this reflection. The first occurred when I found myself sitting in my manager's office in the Department of Mission and Spiritual Care, at Advocate Christ Medical Center. It was that anxious time of year—annual review time. Before we began the review conversation, my manager shared a bit of affirmation that moved me to the foundation of my soul. He said, "Richard, let me begin by saying I appreciate you. I would imagine that there are not many, perhaps only a few chaplains across the country that have been doing the work that you are doing, at the level and for the length of time that you have been doing it. I want you to know that you are appreciated."

The second incident is the fact that recently I was asked to begin working with medical family practice residents on an ongoing basis to "identify challenges and maintain resilience and a sense of mission in their work as physicians" as a part of the Wellness Program. I am not sure just yet how I will engage that group. However, the invitation represents that which gives my work as chaplain a bit of the spice of variety and the challenge to be relevant. Thus, I asked myself "What is resiliency?" and "How have I managed to sustain my stamina for the work of pastoral/spiritual care for twenty-seven years, in such a complex context as at Advocate Christ Medical Center, a Level One Trauma Center?"

A response to these questions can be seen in my responsibility as Sr. Staff Chaplain: to provide experiential educational support to the medical students on rotation from the Advocate Medical Groups' Family Practice Medical Clinic. I accomplish this via a program I called "Shadow the Chaplain at Work." The program affords family practice medical students the opportunity to accompany me as I extend pastoral/spiritual care to patients, families, and the medical staff. Students witness first-hand crisis ministry in the Emergency Department, an array of pastoral/spiritual care issues in the Surgical Trauma Intensive Care (STIC) and in the Neuro Critical Care (NCCU), as well as several other areas of the hospital.

...resiliency in ministry can be embraced when a person finds within themselves the intersection between their professional identity and their spiritual identity The purpose of this experiential learning opportunity is to deepen the student's appreciation for the challenges and needs of patients, families and medical staff, and how chaplains offer meaningful pastoral/spiritual support. I do this in a manner that enhances the student's perspective as a doctor. Students also encounter via discussion the mission, philosophy and theological/theoretical perspective of the role and function of the chaplain as a pastoral/spiritual caregiver. Each student spends four hours on a Friday morning in this experience.



On one occasion, I had the pleasure of hosting a female Hindu student. After about twenty minutes of connecting conversation, we headed to two interdisciplinary rounds, one in the NCCU and one in STIC. Later, the student witnessed several pastoral/spiritual encounters including: ministry with a 24-year-old African American male with a critical gunshot-wound, along with his family; a family/palliative care meeting; a 35-year-old African American woman being treated for anxiety because her mother was seriously ill and expected not to survive and whose baby had died a week earlier; and a 39-year-old Muslim woman whose husband was involved in an automobile accident and died in the emergency trauma center.

As we sat down later to reflect on the morning's events, she said, "I want what you have for myself in my profession as a physician practicing the art of medicine." I asked, "What do you mean?" She replied, "I see your passion and enthusiasm you have for your work. You have a sound and practical understanding of your spirituality as a Christian, yet a sincere hospitality and respect for persons of other religions. I can tell you love what you do, that it fuels what you do, and you actually help people. How can I have that as a Hindu physician?"

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Then I asked her, "What is a major tenet or theme in the Hindu faith." She said, "Wisdom." I thought for a moment and replied, "Earlier in our conversation when I asked, 'What is the most challenging aspect of medical school? What was the most appealing aspect of medical school?' I noticed you have a high investment in working with patients by sharing information that can help them become proactive in the prevention of illness. I once read that wisdom is the wise use of knowledge in decision-making. Perhaps at the core of your Hindu spirituality and your practice of the art of medicine might be the sharing of pertinent medical information in such a way that enhances a patient's knowledge and ability to practice wisdom, or wise decision-making regarding their health condition, so that they might embrace well-being. Thus, you nurture the practice of wisdom in your practice of the art of medicine."

She simultaneously breathed deep, exhaled, smiled broadly, and straightened her posture. Her affect lit up, seemingly indicating that she was experiencing an epiphany— a certain depth of enlightenment in her mind, soma, and spirit. Born in her, at that precise moment was the hopeful possibility that she too could offer the gift of the art of the practice of medicine as a physician, complemented by her authentic spirituality.

I suggest that resiliency in ministry can be embraced when a person finds within themselves the intersection between their professional identity (be it a chaplain, doctor, nurse or otherwise) and their spiritual identity and commitment. It is that giftedness that can be appropriately offered respectfully (implicitly or explicitly) in service to others without offense, and that hope and its ongoing endeavor is resiliency because it is connected to Divinity.

For me, this is one of the touchstones of resiliency in my ministry, a resource for getting up and getting going in the morning when you don't feel like it. It is at that intersection that I find Divine Benevolent Intent and the acceptance of humanity. This is why and what was touched deep within my spiritual core during my review. This is why the medical student experienced an epiphany of mind, soma, and spirit. Because it is the intersection of professional identity and spiritual commitment, that there is a meeting place where Divinity and humanity meet to find common ground, holy ground. To extend the gift of benevolent intent in some small manner is simultaneous to give and receive resiliency.

It is my prayer and hope for you to know in some intimate and empowering manner your meaning-making at the intersection of your professional identity and spiritual commitment. For that awareness of Divinity/spirituality and the human condition is indeed a resource for resiliency.
