

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By the time you receive this Newsletter, Election Day will be less than one week away. If you have not voted early, now is the time. And because it is such a serious task, I encourage everyone to study the candidates and issues carefully. As citizens, we must not only vote but be as well-informed as possible. As people of faith and religious leaders, it is our responsibility to urge all people to do likewise, whether in your congregation or in your circle of friends or beyond.

Furthermore, if you think November 6th means the end of your responsibility in this regard, you are greatly mistaken. Our baptismal promises call us to be prophets. The prophets of old spoke to the conscience of the people as well as to that of the civil and religious rulers. I believe this prophetic role is central for us not only by virtue of baptism but because of our membership in FCM. The leaders of our day need to hear from us and what we consider important.

Fulfilling this duty is consistent with the teaching of Jesus. Being prophetic is not easy and requires commitment through often difficult times. It means we must not simply speak out but listen carefully to all sides. If I rely on only one news source I am seriously limiting my access to complete information. We seem to be moving more rapidly to becoming a divided country. We can change this dynamic by testing what we hear. By doing this we can work together for the common good in every sense of that term.

Take advantage of information offered by the League of Women Voters https://www.lwv.org/ in my opinion one of the best non-partisan ways to enable all of us to have productive discussion on candidates and issues. The October AARP Bulletin offers four online services to help check the facts: https://www.politifact.com https://votesmart.org https://www.realclearpolitics.com and https://ballotpedia.org These resources can be very helpful when you hear differing details and stories. Obtaining accurate information is a necessary first step to the listening that brings us together.

Remembering the example of the prophets, be sure to let your voice be heard by our president and your members of the legislatures, both state and federal. I challenge the FCM membership to stay active, following the example of Jesus our brother who stood up for the poor and disenfranchised. We are called to this work for justice, to be the voice for those who are voiceless, witnessing with our ballots and our actions.

The author of Revelation challenged the people of his day: "I know your deeds, that you are neither cold or hot. I wish you were either one or the other! So, because you are lukewarm—neither hot nor cold—I am about to spit you out of my mouth." (3:15-20) Edmund Burke put it another way: "The only thing necessary for the triumph of evil is for good men to do nothing." The difference between doing nothing and something is EVERYTHING.

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Yes, It Can Happen Here, and it is

On October 15 and 16th I spent some time at the U.S. Holocaust Memorial Museum in Washington, DC. It documents the depths of human depravity and systematic evil. While there I thought of a current example of genocide a world away, the Rohingya expulsion from Myanmar. I also recognized that our country was showing warning signs of demonizing

"others." Those "others," "dangerous others," include Muslims and immigrants, LGBTQI and minorities. They experience day to day discrimination of an increasingly violent expression. But the events of the week of October 21 have brought a new level of violence to our country. A man sent pipe bombs to political leaders and former government officials. A murderer targeted black people in Kentucky, killing two. Another murderer walked into a synagogue in Pittsburgh, PA and killed eleven people who were worshiping. He desired all Jews to die. As followers of Jesus, we must raise our action and awareness. Since we stand with Him, we must visibly stand with the "others" also. To strengthen our capacities to make effective and clear responses we need to continually move toward a higher level in our own spiritual life. It is through our spiritual growth into people of depth, love, and light that we can become part of the remedy to the human weaknesses and day-to-day discrimination shown in our country and up to and including the evil shown so horribly in the Holocaust, the Rohingya expulsion and the events of the terrible week of October 21 in America. The clear action we can take in a few days is to vote in the mid-terms. If a candidate is using fear and separation as a campaign tactic, vote for the other candidate. We can have an impact immediately in this way.

We have a limited amount of time and energy allotted to us in this life. And there are many long term activities we can choose to which to direct our energy. They include necessary actions of personal maintenance, food shelter and clothing. We may find some entertainment necessary to keep us balanced and stable. We recognize our spiritual life is a necessity, so it requires time. Our job and our career path make their own significant demands, and these demands might be the most time-consuming of all.

From one point of view all of these necessary activities are centered upon our own maintenance and survival in the personal and economic worlds. But as a group of Christians, our value system automatically brings to the fore concerns that impact the well-being of the local community in which we live, concerns that impact the state and national levels, concerns about global issues. These concerns are framed in gospel terms, terms of respect for the poor, welcoming the alien, helping the injured and the sick, depending on non-violent change for the better. Living out these concerns takes additional time and attention. By attending to these concerns, we can feel that our Christian commitment is actually having an effect on those around us and that our relationship with Christ is not simply a matter of words but actually of deeds. Each of us must live out the broader community activities as we see fit. Each of us is different. There are some specific supportive activities within our chosen FCM community that we can consider to build it up.

I highlight here several communication activities that can build up awareness of FCM within our own membership and in its broader community. First, we have unlimited space in our FCM Blog. I am requesting that you consider writing one or a series of articles about your own passion and interest and post them on the blog. Send them to Antoinette Marold at communication@FCMmail.org. To encourage this activity which will spread and deepen our own understanding of one another I will began to systematically reach out to members who have offered to write for FCM with such a request. Second, when you have a special event, award or activity of interest, please ask Antoinette to post it to the FCM Facebook account. Then when you see new posts on our Facebook account, share them so that an understanding of FCM spreads among hundreds of people. FCM also has a presence on LinkedIn. Request admission to the FCM LinkedIn group and make contributions there of a professional nature. Our regional vice presidents are working to making video meetings a regular part of their ministry to their regions. Ask your Vice President about the possibility and volunteer to manage it. Finally, begin to make use of Realm to directly communicate with other members of FCM. Many of us need to take a first step of registering into Realm. (Editor's note: The following reflection is part of our 50th Anniversary celebration. Written by FCM member **John Balch** it originally appeared in the **Diaspora** volume 17, number 4 / Winter 1986.)

FCM: Personal Journey by John Balch

Why am I a member of FCM and where are we bound? The answer to the first part of the question is personal and deals with the search for the reason for my existence. The second part is what can members of FCM, by our interaction, teach me about this existence. I find acceptance of my struggles by FCM members a help. I suppose tolerance is natural because just about all of us come from a Christian church that expects people to become good because some human superior demands it.

I am a fallen away Catholic convert who joined the Church at the time of John XXIII. I left when the new pope arrived because I felt I was not good enough to be what was commanded. I found the church a hindrance to my development because, if I felt guilty about my not being good, I would suppress my feelings and not be able to look within to discover the source of my not being good. I needed to be very gentle with myself to look at the unconscious part of my personality from which destructiveness sprang up.

Some authority figures in the church did not practice christian behavior allowing me to grow. Perhaps I would've found a humanistic atheist more "Christian," for at least the humanist would not, claiming to have the authority of God behind him, demand that I must follow him if I were to acquire my answer. I mention atheism here. For me there was a danger of throwing out my belief in God with my disappointment in how members of the Christian church behaved. For, if the Christian church members could not love one another with God claimed to be on their side, then at an emotional level I must have said God does not exist.

So how did I find God? I am of the scientific mind; faith meant nothing to me except I would still search because that was my nature. I started on the psychological approach to improving myself and took up self-hypnosis to plumb the depths of my subconscious. This was of some help because I found if I were upset I could go within a derive the reason for it. The problem with this was that I would find a reason, and three months later I would use self-hypnosis again and find exactly the same reason again. There was no growth.

The next step was meditation and this is where I found God. I know it was God because any answer to a specific problem always came back the same. The answer was to try to do something that was clearly outside of what my own subconscious would've thought of, and it would be difficult to do. I often found my life got better, but not as fast as I would like. It seems the hard work to accomplish growth cannot be avoided.

At this time in my life I am even more disappointed in the Catholic Church's than when I left it. I believe it is an obligation of a proper church to teach its members how to pray, and I believe it is a hit or miss affair for those people who are members of the Catholic Church. They are told to be good, but not how to do so. Either a person accidentally discovers it, or else they lose contact with their own deepest feelings because of guilt. However feelings are necessary for offering up in prayer in order to find answers to follow for our growth.

I believe members of FCM are accepting of each other as a reaction to the authority in the church, and that this acceptance is an aid in the spiritual direct development of the members of FCM. The direct experience of God for each individual is what religion is about. Because we are different the task for each will vary. Let us be tolerant if we can.

The definition of trauma can be different for everyone. Trauma is typically a threat to our survival; an experience that affects the body, brain, and soul in ways that are negative and unexpected. Trauma leaves an imprint on those it affects, changing their lives forever; causing them to feel overwhelmed, confused, powerless, and angry.

I encounter many different variations of trauma in patients who are veterans. In my own personal experience, I can say it sometimes can feel so heavy that no words can express it. The pain that comes with it can feel everlasting.

Chaplains tend to struggle with secondary trauma, involving the emotional residue of exposure experienced in working with people as we hear their trauma stories. Chaplains become witnesses to the pain, fear, and terror that trauma survivors have endured. How we manage it can affect the quality of the patient care we provide and the self-care we must intentionally practice to thrive in such a challenging, yet meaningful vocation.

Personal wholeness can lead others in trauma to wholeness

As a chaplain, I must be aware of what's happening when a patient discloses their trauma story. I cannot address the trauma alone, but need the whole of the medical team to address the trauma that's intertwined within the whole body of the patient. Chaplains provide spiritual care alongside many different disciplines, such as psychology, neurology, social work, and other medical specialties. As one of my C.P.E. supervisors told me, "Butler, you are not Jesus."

In other words, I cannot do all the work, let alone deliver good quality work to a veteran without the help of other disciplines. Each of us from each discipline have something to offer each other as well as something to offer the veteran. Each of us sees through a different lens, a different clinical paradigm. In order to take care of my whole body I remind myself constantly to be intentional by staying in my lane and calling on others for help when it feels like it is time to "switch lanes." I also have to intentionally practice my own personal self-care as well: exercising, eating healthy, spiritual community, time in nature, getting good sleep, seeing a therapist, etc. By practicing our own self-care it enables us to give the best care to our patients rather than just good care.

Spirituality is shaken during trauma

Clinically speaking, care providers must settle down the body before looking at the mind. The brain stores trauma in unique ways. If we push, dismiss, or are flippant in our responses, we can actually further the trauma.

Trauma shakes the spirituality of the patient and provider to their very core.It's important to note when someone is physically activated when sharing their trauma. By letting the bodies grieve as much as the brain and spirit need tochaplains embrace the other by simply being present, and knowing when to seek further professional help.

Trauma causes a spiritual awakening and/or a spiritual deconstruction because it leads to asking questions such as: How can I exist in the world now? Where is God? How do I find community, value, purpose, meaning, my identity, and how can I feel safe in the world again?

Many who have experienced trauma have to learn how to embrace a grief that feels endless. They desperately need us to create a safe place for them to share and receive support. We must be patient. Many of us began life with what we would describe as systems of trusted support: family, community, state, God, and church. Combat veterans go to war literally experiencing hell on earth and return home to a place where they feel they no longer fit in or can be understood.

The trauma they experience hurts so much it results in existential shame about who they are and who God is in their life. For them to talk about it again is traumatic in and of itself – to feel the pain again and admit how much it hurts.

We, as a spiritual community, the church at large, and care providers serving in our various roles of ministry can create safe places for our veterans and for civilians to just be human beings returning to wholeness.

Unless we have experienced the trauma, we cannot know the depth of where they are and where they are going, but we, as chaplains, can create safe spaces for them to be who they are and truly say how they feel.

We all are seeking meaning-making; seeking a purpose, value, personhood, and acceptance. We all experience doubts and have hard questions to confront time to time regarding our spirituality. We can help those affected by trauma return to wholeness by creating safe spaces for people to be seen and heard. Rev. Barbra Brown Taylor said it best when she said, "Holiness is simply paying attention."

For many of us in FCM, grief is often at the heart of our ministry. As pastoral caregivers, we know we can never skirt around grief. Rather, we must journey through it even though this may mean meandering down side roads or getting lost in our emotions. This is especially true during the holidays or anniversaries we used to share with our now-deceased loved ones.

Here are some suggestions I discovered to help those you serve cope with the holidays. They come from the collected wisdom of others who have lost loved ones and re-experienced that loss again during the holidays.

- Be patient with yourself and realistic about what you can do and what you cannot do during the holidays. Things are different now. So, adapt your cherished holiday traditions to what you now need in your life.
- Listen to your heart and acknowledge your limits during this tender time of the year. Talk to a trusted friend about your mixed and conflicted feelings. It's OK to cry and feel sad, even when everyone is smiling and happy.
- Focus on the spiritual dimension of the holidays count your blessings and remember God's promise of everlasting love and life.
- If going to your home church is too much for you this year, try a new one for the holidays.

The death of a loved one, we all know, changes our lives forever. It is especially important to acknowledge that reality and be gentle with ourselves all year – and especially during this holiday season. May this prayer by Thomas Merton give us hope to carry on:

My Lord God,

I have no idea where I am going. I do not see the road ahead of me. I cannot know for certain where it will end. Nor do I really know myself, and the fact that I think I am following your will does not mean that I am actually doing so. But I believe that the desire to please you does in fact please you. and I hope I have that desire in all that I am doing. I hope that I will never do anything apart from that desire. And I know that if I do this. you will lead me by the right road, though I may know nothing about it. Therefore, I will trust you always though I may seem to be lost and in the shadow of death. I will not fear, for you are ever with me, And you will never leave me to face my perils alone.
