


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

What is Realm? Realm is a real ministry tool.

Realm is an online ministry tool designed for real time connection. It helps FCM connect with you and you connect with us. Realm allows you to manage your personal information and who is allowed to see it, and keep in touch with the groups that matter to you.

Why use Realm? Realm strengthens FCM connections

Realm helps us serve you better. Everyone can be connected from anywhere at any time, right from our mobile devices. It engages everyone in the life of FCM by supporting the healthy relationships essential to our mission. We'll stay organized, and you'll stay informed about all of the opportunities for fellowship. When we share life together, we will grow together.

What about my privacy? Realm is safe, private, and secure.

Your privacy is one of our greatest concerns. Realm is only made up of the people in FCM, it's not like a social network that's open to everyone. Realm keeps your data safe and gives you control over what information you share and who can see it.

How do I start? Follow a few simple steps.

1. Use the link in your email invitation and follow the steps to create a password.

You will receive an email invite to create an account in our new online community, Realm. Use the link in that email and follow the steps to create a password.

2. Log In

Log in to the Realm site using your email and the password you created in step 1.

3. Update your profile.

Every FCM member gets a unique profile. Check to make sure that we have your address and other personal information entered correctly under My Profile. If anything is incorrect, you can change it.

3. Get the Mobile App.

The easiest way people in FCM will access Realm is with their mobile device. Although it's not required, it certainly is a popular and convenient way to connect. Stay connected to FCM wherever you go by downloading the free Connect — Our Church Community app for iPhone and Android devices.

Note: Your Realm login works on your home computer and on your mobile devices, so when you sign into Realm, use the login you created in step 1 for the computer or the app.

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Hearing Her Voice: A Revised Lectionary

(Editor's note: As most members are aware, the Lectionary provides a structured selection of Bible readings arranged for use at Mass throughout the year. Thanks to Jane Via and Nancy Corran from our Pacific Region for their ground-breaking ministry and for sharing their efforts with FCM.)

When Mary Magdalene the Apostle Catholic Community was born in November 2005 in San Diego, I accepted the responsibility for rendering the readings for our liturgies in inclusive language. I soon discovered the content of the lectionary raised some serious questions, particularly with regard to the gospel passages. As a former professor of New Testament Studies I was familiar with gospel narratives and so recognized that the passage from the previous week and the one for the coming week were proceeding through the gospel in a somewhat orderly fashion from beginning to end. At the same time, I realized that with some regularity the Lectionary for Sundays and Major Feast Days (SMFD) skipped over verses about women. With the exception of the Gospel we call "Luke" there are limited narratives about women anyway, so the absence of these narratives in the Sunday lectionary became glaring.

Consciously or unconsciously, the roles of women in the Bible were being withheld from wider Christian consciousness of Scripture which is created through the Liturgy of the Word during Sunday Mass.

That initial observation caused Nancy Corran and me to scrutinize the other Sunday readings. We realized that important passages about women were excluded from the SMFD Lectionary while some negative passages were included. That led to a careful review of the passages in the Hebrew Bible included in the SMFD Lectionary. Again, it became clear that narratives involving women were conspicuous in their absence.

Initially, I began to address the issue by revising the canonical (lectionary) gospel reading to include any passage about a woman that had been dropped. When Nancy took over the lectionary project, she began the work of bringing passages about women from the wider New Testament and the Hebrew Bible into the framework of the lectionary. Over time, we realized that the exclusion of passages about women in the Roman Catholic Lectionary was systemic. Consciously or unconsciously, the roles (especially the positive roles) of women in the Bible were being withheld from wider Christian consciousness of Scripture which is created through the Liturgy of the Word during Sunday Mass.

Here are a f ew examples:

(1) The canonical reading of God's visitation to Abraham and Sarah, which ends at Genesis 18:10a, eliminates Sarah's presence, words and her unmediated conversation with God. The CCL restores Sarah's part in the Biblical narrative by adding Genesis 18:10b-15 to the canonical reading.

(2) In Hannah's story (1 Samuel 1:1-2:21), Hannah's husband tells her to do what she thinks is best and remain home from a return trip to Shiloh (1 Samuel 1:23). The singular verse in which Elkanah affirms Hannah's authority in their family is excluded from the canonical reading which occurs on the Feast of the Holy Family (1 Samuel 20-22, 24-28).

- (3) The entire Book of Ruth, in which two women are the protagonists, is excluded from the SMFD Lectionary.
- (4) In John 20:11-18, Jesus makes his first resurrection appearance to Mary Magdalene and sends her to announce the good news to the brothers (arguably meaning brothers and sisters). Despite Pope Francis' decision to honor Mary as an apostle of the church, this passage is excluded from the lectionary's readings for Easter as well as any other Sunday.
- (5) Luke 13:10-17, the narrative about the Bent Over Woman, is excluded from the canonical Lectionary, although the passages which precede it and follow it are included. In that narrative, Jesus heals a woman on the Sabbath during a synagogue service, calling her to him while he was teaching.
- (6) The story of Lydia and the synagogue of women which Paul visited (Acts 16:11-15, 40) is excluded.

Recognizing and correcting these omissions over twelve years has led us to the creation of the Comprehensive Catholic Lectionary (CCL), presented in the familiar three-year cycle for Sundays and major feast days. In 2018, we offered the result of our work to the Women's Ordination Conference (WOC) as part of their fundraising efforts. Nancy and I work as volunteers and all monies received go to WOC. We update the lectionary by season, attempting to stay far enough ahead that independent Catholic communities can plan comfortably for their liturgical celebrations.

The purposes of the CCL are:

- (1) to generally follow the Roman Catholic Lectionary for SMFDs but to add every significant story about women in the Bible not included, namely those that appear in gospel texts, other New Testament texts and texts about significant women in the Hebrew Bible.
- (2) to eliminate exclusive language for God and human beings. In the CCL, masculine language for God is often substituted with gender neutral words and when the original Biblical language warrants it with feminine words.
- (3) to expose and/or familiarize believers with the entire spectrum of Biblical readings and history, from the foundational stories of the Hebrew Bible to the end of the NT period where doctrinal or dogmatic interests do not dictate text selection.
- (4) to educate believers on the broad and diverse spectrum of Biblical theologies.
- (5) to select passages from Biblical books which honor the most *important literary and theological contributions* of the writers, especially the Evangelists.

If they do not hear about the strong women of the Bible and their leadership, believers are easily convinced that women have no place in ordained ministry or in leadership within the church.

The CCL seeks to correct this major deficit of the Roman Catholic SMFD Lectionary and its accompanying implication that there were no women in Biblical history whose lives matter with respect to the contemporary church or the faith of the contemporary believer. If they do not hear about the strong women of the Bible and their leadership in Israel's faith, about the many women disciples' in Jesus' life who shared his ministry and accompanied him on his journey to Jerusalem and to his death, believers are easily convinced that women have no place in ordained ministry or in leadership within the church. Simply put, it is easier to maintain the second-class status of women. The canonical lectionary leaves women, especially young women with few if any role models for ministry and leadership in the Church. To make matters worse, insofar as the second-class status of women is presented through the lectionary as divinely inspired, the exclusion of narratives about women and girls feeds the connection between Christian faith and the physical, emotional and sexual abuse of women and children.

The CCL includes readings rendered in inclusive language with as much attention to the literary style and meaning of the ancient text as possible. We hope you will take the time to explore the CCL on the WOC website https://www.inclusivelectionary.org/ and that if you are part of an independent Roman Catholic community or parish, you will consider adopting the CCL in your worship. And please, if your community can afford it contribute to WOC which makes publication of the CCL possible.

Our Beautiful Home

(Editor's note: As part of FCM's commitment to earth care and in particular the devastating reality of global warming, we are grateful to Northeast member Arlene for the following crucial information and her accompanying poem.)

I believe our Creator desires 1) that we orient ourselves toward the Good Future to which our Creator has consistently beckoned us and 2) that we endeavor to boldly and confidently move in that direction. I further believe that the *ONE* *G*O*D* of the Multiverse is helping us and desires to help us even more. If you so desire, you may review some background information on the poem that follows.

CO2 in the Troposphere: The Troposphere is the layer of Earth's atmosphere where the different types of greenhouse gases collect. For the sake of brevity, I reference only the most prevalent of these: CO2.

Parts per million: This measurement is what scientists use to quantify the various gases in our atmosphere. In the early stages of the world's 'Carbon-Heavy Industrial Age', specifically around 1880, the tropospheric CO2 level was in the neighborhood of 278 PPM. By 1958, it was 317 PPM. In the mid-to-late 1980's we crossed 350 PPM and we now stand at 411 PPM.

Global Mean Surface Temperature: With an average rate of 0.07 degrees C per decade since 1880, and 0.17 degrees C per decade since 1970. Doesn't sound like much, but it takes a lot of energy to heat this entire planet.

Warmest years on record: The warmest 19 years have all occurred in the past twenty years. The warmest of the warmest are 2015, 2016 (the highest), 2017, and 2018. Have to go back to pre-1978 to find years that are not at least nominally warmer than the 20th Century average.

Paradise: The retirement town decimated by the extreme behavior of California's 2018 Camp Fire. Weather-related events such as wildfires, extreme precipitation or lack thereof, heat waves and record cold spells are exacerbated by, and among the many effects of, global warming.

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The Challenge of Moving Toward Non-duality

There appears to be more reference in our contemporary discourse about consciousness, awareness, waking up than ever before. It is not unusual to hear of Westerners seeking teaching and teachers in the East----Buddhism, Hinduism, Taoism, etc. Something is stirring! Perhaps this phenomenon is related to a feeling of emptiness experienced by so many in our unproductive obsession with "STUFF," physical stuff or mental clutter. A friend told me that her eight-year old grandson said to her, "Gramma, you gotts too much stuffs!"

In our society we place great importance on success. Because of our upbringing the importance of results even permeates our spiritual/religious expectations leading us to think that "success" in practices such as meditation "should" result in "spiritual experiences," which, as mystics assure us are passing, impermanent like everything else and actually not significant in themselves. Yes, there may be consequences from experiences which transform a person's life, but the experiences themselves need to be let go, not sought after as ends in themselves. "When Shunryu Suzuki was once asked why he never referred to his enlightenment experience, his wife, who was sitting in the back of the hall, stood up and said, 'Because he never had one!' The recognition of our true nature is not an exotic experience. Indeed, it is not an experience at all."1

Rupert Spira speaks of "the essential non-dual understanding that lies at the heart of all the great religious and spiritual traditions." They all call us to waking up, consciousness, awareness. Essential non-dual understanding means: we are all one—not separate as it may appear.

In the Gospel of John, Jesus prays "that all may be one as you, Father, are in me and I in you...that they may be [one] in us..." (Jn. 17: 21) This prayer is not some romantic utopia of a universal hug among separate beings. It is a realization that all seemingly separate beings are but a manifestation of the ONLY BEING. Richard Rohr states: "God is not a being among other beings, but rather Being itself revealed for any mature seeker." It is my observation that the implication of this saying in John's Gospel has never been taken to its conclusion in mainline Christianity!

The invocation of Hazrat Inayat Khan who brought Sufism to the West from India in 1910, speaks to this: "Toward the One, the perfection of love, harmony and beauty, the only Being, united with all the illuminated souls who form the embodiment of the Mystery, the Spirit of Guidance." Then there is the Gayatri Mantra from the Rig Veda, in written form 2,500-3,500 years old (possibly more than 6,000) which might be translated as: "All-pervasive Consciousness is worthy of being sought. We are devoted to that Divine Light which bestows understanding. It energizes, guides, and inspires our intuitive grasp of reality."

In Islam, the earliest criterion of orthodoxy was the phrase, "there is nothing but Allah, God, Oneness, Unity." From another source: "The words 'Allah' and 'God' refer to the ineffable reality, the essence of all things. Allah includes everything and depends upon nothing for existence." In another source, Richard Rohr writes: "The brilliant word, non-duality (advaita in Sanskrit), was used by many in different traditions in the East to distinguish from total and perfect absorption or enmeshment. Facing some of the same challenges of modern-day ecology and quantum physics, they did not want to say that all things were metaphysically or physically identical, nor did they want to separate and disconnect everything." And from another source stated even more clearly: All things "have no independent existence of their own. They are neither identical to nor distinct from the

This depth, this heart lying at the center of all the great religious and spiritual traditions, all of which have their own mystics who know this bottom-line truth about oneness and non-duality presents a serious challenge to institutional religions as they are. Institutional religions create separateness as soon as doctrines or dogmas are established. Dogmatic or doctrinal fundamentalism leads to extremes. If you accept the doctrine or dogma, you are in; if you do not accept the doctrine or dogma, you are out. Other religious traditions are more often than not seen as false. Although this does secure a sense of safety, of "being sure" it also results in distinction. God is seen as separate and as judgmental, ready to punish deviant behavior.

Transformation happens one person at a time, which requires time and patience and love. It is up to us whether we wish to join the swell of growing consciousness and to invite others to join as well.

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The Challenge of Moving Toward Non-duality contd 2

Rohr offers a completely different understanding: "Any talk of anger in God, 'wrath' in God, unforgiveness in God, or any kind of holding back whatsoever, the Cappadocian mystics would see as theologically impossible and forever undone in a Trinitarian notion of God. Nothing human can stop the flow of divine love; we cannot undo the eternal pattern even by our worst sin."7

In our growing up and adulthood we heard plenty about sin. Rohr writes: "Sin is the state of being closed down, shut off, blocked, and thus resisting the eternal flow that we're meant to be."8 This Trinity is a constant flow of giving and receiving, which dynamic actually characterizes the whole universe. "What could have been a Divine Wave, we have for the most part related to as a static particle god."9 With such a god patriarchy has, can and does thrive. A major obstacle to entering into the growing swell of awareness is that institutional, patriarchal religions very quickly interpreted mythology in literal terms, losing the rich and lasting meaning in the stories whether or not the stories are historically based.

The challenge of addressing patriarchy for institutional Christianity as well as for other religious traditions is gargantuan. What needs to happen will not happen quickly but neither did the unfolding of the Universe. The appearance of life was a trial and error process and once it appeared for the first time, it lasted only a moment, but eventually life held on and here we are, part of this awesome green planet.

Transformation happens one person at a time, which requires time and patience and love. It is up to us whether we wish to join the swell of growing consciousness and to invite others to join as well. Systems change as individuals change, one person at a time. This change is also greatly enhanced as folks gather in loving, sharing communities and as communities interact and communicate with other like communities.

We are challenged to chart a path in our spiritual journeys which will prove useful to the authentic growth for which we all yearn. What might a process of transformation from literalism and separation to awareness of our oneness look like? It begins with the understanding that change and growth happen as part of life. Karl Jung said that human beings grow only in relationship. For the process of transformation, we need to begin at the beginning: as children in atmospheres of love, support and trust.

For example, most children in the West believe in Santa Claus. Caring adults know that the Santa story has an historical base in St. Nicholas. They indulge the Santa fantasy to give joy and excitement to their children. At the right time they guide their children to the awareness that the story has the meaning of "giving and receiving."

Even if Santa as such actually existed, his existence would be quite irrelevant since it is the meaning which makes the difference, in this case the meaning of "giving and receiving." The loving, supporting community of family helps children to transition and grasp the meaning of Santa Claus. This provides a model of what needs to happen as a person grows older.

The community further provides the context of love, safety and trust as one's education proceeds. Here is another example: The Buddha was an historical figure. He is said to have stated: "If you meet the Buddha on the road, kill him." It is the rich tradition that he taught which, if practiced can lead to transformation, not his historical existence.

The Jesus tradition is another rich tradition, the teachings of which can lead to transformation. But the "practice" is not about external exercises like attending church services and performing external actions, or rote recitation of prayers. External behavior by itself, does not transform. Jesus had plenty to say about the external observances of the Pharisee sect of the time! The danger of compromising the Jesus tradition's potential for transformation of consciousness lies in taking the story literally rather than grasping its authentic intent. The intent is transformation of consciousness, coming to the awareness that we are in God and God is in us, that we are not identical to God's Essence but neither are we distinct from that Divine Essence! Is this not the Good News? Again John 17:21, as cited above "that all may be one as you, Father, are in me and I in you...that they may be [one] in us..." The Book of Acts tells of Paul's discourse to the people of Athens. Paul speaks of an altar inscribed "to a God unknown...in whom we live and move and have our being." Acts 17:23 and 28.


