The Survey Says... Christy Howard-Steele, Chairperson

I am happy to report that during the February 2020 Circle of Directors meeting, FCM's leadership spent time reviewing the write-in responses to question 23 from the membership survey completed last April. Question 23 asked members "What top 2 or 3 priorities FCM should consider? Short term? Long term?" Not many responses made a distinction between short term and long term so the leadership team considered all the responses together. Member responses were tabulated into the following categories. Input was considered regardless of whether it was a single suggestion, or it was suggested multiple times.

- I. Membership: The suggestions include increasing/improving regional outreach and gatherings, recruiting and integrating younger members, recruiting more people of color, recruiting or developing faith communities, offering support for members through professional development and educational opportunities, streamlining the commissioning and endorsement processes, becoming a military endorser.
- II. Identity: The suggestions include considering a name change, exploring international dimensions, becoming inter- or trans-denominational, focus on unity in Christ, strongly advocate for optional celibacy and women's ordination.
- III. Social Justice: The suggestions include moving from talk to more social justice living, doing local or regional service projects, continuing to grow in our stances and statements on social justice concerns.
- IV. Visibility: The suggestions include strengthening our local and regional presence, working with other denominations or traditions, building name recognition among denominations and seminaries
- V. Communication: The suggestions include improving the website, making Realm the main communication, developing a vehicle for sharing prayer requests and for dialogue.

FCM leaders individually assigned priorities to the survey results. These individual results were then combined to suggest our focus for the upcoming year. The following three areas of focus were selected for this year:

2020 Focus

- Increase/improve regional outreach and gatherings (this is also the most frequent suggestion from the survey)
- 2. Social justice
- 3. Improve membership support (this is the 2nd most frequent suggestion from the survey)

We see these areas as a focus on building our community, developing and supporting our members while also critically engaging the issues of our times. Of course, while members of FCM leadership have volunteered to work on these initiatives, we are open and need your involvement. - · Military endorsement: FCM has met all of the qualifications to become a military endorser except we still need a candidate to get on the list of approved endorsers! A candidate must meet the age and physical screening requirements and enlist in active duty in one of the branches of the military not the Reserves or National Guard; must have or earn a M.Div.; must not have been previously endorsed by another tradition; and must have 2 years of experience as a spiritual leader. If you know someone interested in this path, please refer them to the Committee on Specialized Ministries at specialized Ministries at special
- Established Social Consciousness Committee to propose to FCM leadership statements for publication reflecting FCM's perspective on relevant, current events or issues consistent with FCM values.
- · While we acknowledge that the membership renewal in Realm did not go as smoothly as we hoped, FCM did take a huge step towards efficiency. We expect that this process will eventually free all of us to focus on what's most important: our relationships with each other!

Plant and Grow

My thanks to the Circle of Directors of FCM for their hard work at the Circle meeting on February 7 and 8. (See https://www.federationofchristianministries.org/circle-of-directors/fcm-circle-of-directors.html) They are such a benefit.

Led for the first time by Chairperson Christy Howard-Steele, the 10 members physically present were supplemented by the Zoom presence of Pacific Vice President Tracy Peterson and of Mountains and Plains Vice President Richard James. Antoinette Marold and Amy Simpson Bennethum attended electronically for their segments. Thank you to them. We attended to basic Circle business such as reviewing the financials and coming to decisions on those members to be commissioned and endorsed. We also looked at the future as we reflected on the suggestions from membership, made during our survey of the membership from last year. Several working groups were formed to creatively respond to possibilities offered by the membership. Southern Region Vice President Diane Dougherty is now leading a small group who are observing our current American cultural landscape to decide upon issues about which FCM leadership and membership could comment. This work group is a response by the Circle to the suggestion in the survey that a continued awareness of social justice issues should characterize FCM into the future.

Growing pains are manifesting themselves for our volunteer organization. As our individual membership has climbed to its largest number of full dues paying members in our history, the demands of time on our vice presidents have grown. To mitigate some of these demands the Circle is exploring new ideas by which existing personnel categories such as Area Representatives could be structured to better support FCM's efforts in each region. In addition, a new category of membership specialist is being considered to support the efforts of the vice presidents in preparing members for commissioning. We must do additional development work on this project, and we will report results to you in the next few months. This FCM organizational work will plant new ideas now to build growth for the future.

Plant and Grow, Pray and Fast

Pray and Fast

The Assyrian Empire was feared and hated. It expanded through organization and military discipline, wielding new iron weapons. The army terrorized its opponents and at its height it dominated the Fertile Crescent (10th through 7th century BCE). Assyria had subjugated the Kingdom of Judah and besieged Jerusalem in 701 BCE. Yet, it was to the Assyrian superpower's capital, Nineveh, that Jonah was directed by God. Jonah was resistive and half-hearted in making his call to Nineveh to repent. Despite this, the King and all the people "... proclaimed a fast and all of them, great and small, put on sackcloth." (Jonah 3: 5) Their fasting and repentance caused God to change his mind. He did not destroy Nineveh.

Where am I going with this, you can reasonably ask. Currently, our country is divided and people do not respect one another. People of different viewpoints are seen as evil instead of just being seen as simply holding different viewpoints. Fear is present to so many. A national change of heart and repentance from these attitudes, feelings and behaviors would benefit us, just as Nineveh's repentance benefitted them. Diane Dougherty's new social vision working group presented a plan to the Circle, and the Circle affirmed it. It is a plan developed by a number of significant religious leaders and its purpose is spiritual work toward repentance. They have called for prayer and fasting for America from Ash Wednesday until our November election. I invite you to follow this program of the soul. Pray daily, fast on Wednesdays.

In *The Aquarian Gospel of Jesus the Christ* (Levi H. Dowling, Penguin Group, 2009) this comment is attributed to Dowling's Jesus, "A fast is deed of soul [sic], and like a prayer, it is a function of the silence of the soul. God never passes by unnoticed any prayer, or fast. He walks within the silence, and his benedictions rest on every effort of the soul. (Chapter 94: 16-17)

A united FCM community, fasting and praying, has the power to impact our American society. I am fully onboard; will you join me?

- And it has companioned people in times of spiritual and emotional need.


If you want to see this service continue, won't you consider supporting the FCM Endowment Fund with:

We are delighted to announce that nineteen (19) FCM members from 11 states: CA, CT, FL, HI, IL, MI, NJ, NY, OH, PA, and VA attended the first 2020 FCM Faith Communities Zoom Networking Meeting on Sunday February 2, the largest number of participants thus far. Marita Grudzen facilitated the discussion on " Leadership in Ministry: Who Do We Choose to Be?" Prior to the meeting Marita suggested reading excerpts from the book by Margaret J. Wheatley, Facing Reality - Claiming Leadership - Restoring Sanity as a resource. During the meeting participants shared their responses to the following questions: * How do we conceive of leadership in our faith communities?

- * Is there one leader, many leaders, or does the community lead itself?
- * What is the function of leadership in our faith community?
- * What do we want in our leaders, in ourselves so we step up to our mission?
- * What would we see in the leaders we admire in ministry?

The second meeting's topic is Racism and will be held on Sunday, March 1 at 7-8 pm EST Premise: If we all have the responsibility to create a just society, what can and are we doing to acknowledge racism and work toward a just society? The culture of racism is the shared beliefs and assumptions that undergird the economic, social, political disparities experienced by different groups. The incidents of racial trauma are continuous and chronic as we observe increased police killings of unarmed black people, hate crimes against Muslims (or those who are assumed to be), assaults and killings of transgender, people of color or indigenous (POCI), violation of indigenous lands, and the dehumanization of immigrant communities.

The Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. & Multicultural Taste Celebration

During the past 26 years, I have chaired a celebration at Advocate Christ Medical Center and Children's Hospital, remembering the life and work of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. The objective for the MLK Celebration Day has always been to celebrate the life and work of Dr. King considering Advocate's mission, values, and philosophy, in a manner that is multiculturally sensitive within the diverse context of the hospital.

On Monday, January 20th, 2020, the Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and Multicultural Taste Celebration, was held in the Robert N. Stein Auditorium. The theme, "Serving Humanity Inspired by Divine Benevolent Intent," guided our planning efforts. The program began with a reflection, which included a brief audio excerpt from Dr. King's speech entitled "The Drum Major Instinct," delivered on February 4th, 1968. Brief thematic MLK Quotes, linked with Advocate Aurora's mission, "Helping People to Live Well," followed the MLK audio excerpt. Participating team members included Michele Beard, Rev. Horace Bridges, Tony Estrella, Dr. Roman Kozyckyj, Rev. Eliza Leatherberry, Lacrecia Spence, and Esther Talusan. The program also featured a keynote speaker performance by Grammy and NAACP Image Award-winning performance poet, recording artist, actor, and author, J. Ivy, who discussed how Dr. King's legacy had impacted his life. J. Ivy is the author of the book "Dear Father Breaking, The Cycle of Pain," which attendees received at the celebration.

The Multicultural Taste Celebration followed the program, consisting of food donated by associates, twelve local restaurants. Participating restaurants included: Angelica's Bakery; Jedi's Restaurant; Barraco's Restaurant; Mabenka Lithuanian / Polish Restaurant; Chi-Tung Restaurant, Papa Joe's Restaurant; Chuck's Southern Comfort Café; P.F. Chang's; Corner Bakery; Siam Thai Restaurant; Fox's Restaurant; and Spicy Thai Lao Restaurant. Also, retired team member Barbeque Man, Mr. Bernie Whitaker prepared 200 lbs. of barbeque, which was a big hit!

Thus, we celebrated the life and work of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. in a diverse, inclusive, multiculturally sensitive manner and in-light of Advocate /Aurora's mission, values, and philosophy. Over the years, the Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Day has become one of the most well-celebrated events at the hospital. Nineteen people attended the first celebration; now, approximately 300-plus gather under one roof to enjoy an inspirational message and music, as a true testimony to this institution's celebration of diversity. On Tuesday, January 21, 2020, the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and Multicultural Taste Celebration was featured in the attached article entitled 'Hospital Gathers to Promote Togetherness' by Frank Vaisvilas, Freelance Columnist in the Daily Southtown newspaper.

The celebration is a testimony to this labor of "love" in that each team member prepares their most treasured ethnic dish to share over a conversation during the multicultural taste. In this way, the event focuses on uniting our associates, physicians, volunteers, patients, families, and our community in rejoicing in their ethnicity and commonality.

FCM bridges the past and the present through the Progressive Catholic Coalition (PCC)

The United States has continued its colonialism in the Western Hemisphere through our Defense Department by providing military education and training to the Latin American militaries. First established as the School of the Americas (SOA) at Fort Benning, Georgia, it is now called The Western Hemisphere Institute for Security Cooperation (WHINSEC). SOA Watch (SOAW) was formed with the goal of dismantling border imperialism and ending all forms of US-led and supported violence. The effort includes those associated actions of these Latin American militaries through direct action and alliances with others, focused on the many forms of US imperialism contributing to the crises that are driving migrants fleeing their home countries for our borders.

After three years of holding a "Border Encuentro (gathering)," SOAW returned in 2019 to the gates of Ft. Benning. Our FCM was there through its sponsorship of the Progressive Catholic Coalition because it wanted to recognize the event 30 years ago that caused the movement's founding. That November 16, 1989 event was the brutal military attack on this private Jesuit University of Central America in El Salvador. Wikipedia cites that "Ellacuría, Martín-Baró and Segundo Montes, along with three other Jesuit professors, their housekeeper, and her daughter, were murdered by the Salvadoran Armed forces on November 16, 1989, in one of the most notorious episodes from the Civil War." Father Roy Bourgeois initially formed The SOA Watch movement to denounce this massacre, one of the many atrocities that occurred in Central America as the United States-funded civil wars and trained military at the SOA/WHINSEC.

High school students and many, older others were happy to see the presence of the "reforming church" represented by the PCC in this protest demonstration. FCM has sponsored the Progressive Catholic Coalition each year since 2004. The context for the PCC presence each year is that this gathering, like a family reunion, brings all together in one unified spirit of warm sharing of stories of what's been done back home to further the efforts of the SOA Watch movement. Sunday Service used a PCC Inclusive Liturgy

The Association of Roman Catholic Women Priests (ARCWP) members **Kathy Butler** and **Janet Sevre-Duszynska** composed the Sunday Liturgy which was led by **Katy Zatsick** and **Diane Dougherty**. The liturgy was modeled on the way communities in El Salvador allow time for everyone to include their comments so that the Spirit is respected in the gathered believers before the prayer continues. An informal pizza party followed the liturgy. ARCWP is also sponsored by the FCM.

At the PCC Information Table

Young people from around the country were more evident this year with eight of them from St. Charles Borromeo Church, Skillmen, New Jersey. These students gathered around the PCC information table to ask about the sponsoring organizations. One of them commented how welcome they have been made to feel among the people from around the country. To these young people, being recognized by so many "gray hairs" was an unexpected blessing. Great Lakes Members Approved for Ordination (Commissioning)

I am excited to share the news with you that three FCM members in the Great Lakes Region has been approved for Ordination (commissioning). I would like to take this time to let you know who they are.



Rev. Garrett Brown became a member of FCM in the fall of 2019. He was raised in rural Kentucky in a United Methodist family. Garrett went off to college with the dream of becoming a worship leader in a large church. He was fortunate to receive a scholarship to Asbury University, Wilmore, KY which opened the door so that he could go after this dream. Yet, when he got there, he saw the need to make a change. He changed his major to a B.A. in Christian Studies. He followed this degree with a M.A. in Theological Studies.

Garrett took his first unit of CPE while at Asbury Theological Seminary. This experience was like planting a seed in very fertile soil. It was followed by a year of serving as a Chaplain PRN at the University of Kentucky Chandler Hospital, then one year serving as a Chaplain Resident at Cincinnati's Children's, and a second year Chaplain Resident year at Cincinnati's Children's. All of this training and its human experiences brought Garrett's vision for ministry into view. He believes he is called to be a full-time hospice chaplain. In addition to this belief, all of this training and human experience changed Garrett's perspective on becoming ordained as a United Methodist Minister. The denomination has and is changing in ways that are not making Garrett comfortable. He has come to see FCM as the best denomination for him. He now works at Vitas Healthcare and is grateful that he is doing exactly what he feels called to do in ministry.



Rev. Naomi Calkins-Golter became member of FCM in February 2019. She is a woman who began a ten-year career as a chemist after completing college in 1996. She also worked as a Youth Pastor in a United Methodist Church at that time. She made the decision to change careers in 2006 and she went on to seminary, studying at Asbury Theological Seminary. At that same time, she was called to serve for the first time as a pastor to a United Methodist Church. She completed seminary in 2014. During this time in her life, she changed denominations to Evangelical Lutheran believing that it was a better fit for her.

Naomi's family moved to Ohio and when she returned to ministry in this state, she her ministry in a new direction—as a Chaplain. She began to take CPE, completing two units at Ohio Health Hospital in Columbus, Ohio and two units at Nationwide Children's Hospital, Columbus, OH. This was a great time of spiritual discernment for Naomi. She grew to recognize that she was neither a true Methodist nor Evangelical Lutheran minister. CPE and conversation with her CPE Educator caused her to look at FCM for membership and ordination. Naomi found FCM to be a better fit for her denominationally speaking. She enjoys the chaplaincy and was offered a job with Fairhope Hospices, Lancaster, Ohio beginning in February 2020. In addition to this, In January of 2020, Naomi was called to a church in Athens, Ohio to be its pastor. This time, she is serving at a Disciples of Christ church.



I have known **Rev. John Wooden** for 10 years. When I attended King Avenue UMC, John Wooden was an associate minister at the church working on an abstract with the goal of planting a new church in the Columbus area. With the blessing of King Avenue, John set out with sixteen young adults to plant this church which has grown to be a church which offers 2 Sunday services and many programs that meet the needs of many. His philosophy of ministry is simple, to love one another; it is the foundation of the ministries that go out from Stone Village.

John writes that "The reason I am seeking commissioning with FCM is due to the UMC's homophobic policies regarding LGBTQI persons. As an Elder in the UMC, who openly identifies as a gay man, my credentials, my church, and my livelihood are at risk. At any moment within the UMC, a formal complaint can be filed against me due to my sexuality. With the UMC's move toward a 'traditionalist' model, I am now at greater risk of being persecuted and punished within the church."


The Rev. Cyreta Oduniyi, M.Div.
