New Year's Resolution



It's December 3_{rd} and I am seeing new people come into my gym for morning workouts. So, I think to myself, "if there ever was a time when people should commit themselves to a New Year's Resolution before New Year's Day, now it that time!"

America should take on a New Year's Resolution. Do you want to know what it should be? Well, I'll tell you anyway. I think that America should work hard at listening to and talking with one another much, much more in 2021.

The year 2020 has been a challenging one, partly because it feels like the America that I know and love is unraveling right before my eyes. 


Will Pope Francis or a Successor Call a Vatican III Council? Some Global and Historical



Each bi-month I reach out to several members from our list of those members willing to write short (500 words or so) articles for our Newsletter. I ask for information on ministries or ministry moments that our members and/or our communities are actively pursuing. This article on one such special ministry came from one of our FCM members, Paul Schleitwiler. of Westchester, IL. Tom Cruse, Newsletter Editor.



Everyone needs prayers and a warm hug, especially at critical times. Prayer shawls, lap blankets and scarves can carry our prayers to those in need and hug them when we cannot.

The St. Giles Family Mass (Non-FCM) Community has had a shawl ministry for years. In the beginning, a few women knitted and crocheted shawls which one of the pastors would take to those in need. Since I crochet, one woman told me they needed lap blankets for men. So, I joined. The best way to recruit is to ask someone to help with a task.

Since then, we began to enlist the whole community in praying and in bringing shawls and blankets to those they knew needed them. We first asked for their prayers and listing what we were praying for in our weekly announcements. Now I edit and publish a quarterly newsletter which includes that plus statistics of what we have made and given out, thanks from recipients or their caregivers, news of events, patterns and humor. We have a page on the St. Giles website with current and back issues of the newsletter and current events, such as healing masses where those prayed for can receive a shawl, blanket, scarf or pocket "blessing square" they choose. Our web page shows up in the first few hits of a Google search and has elicited requests from across the country. A church in California has asked for our help in setting up their own shawl ministry. All this has reaped donations of money and yarn and one grant, so far, to support the ministry.

We have also made purses and headbands for girls at Mercy Home. We are now making scarves for them, for asylum seekers at two points on the border and a detention center and for another church's outreach to the homeless. Asking someone to help has increased our number of crafters to over thirty regular members and some who have made one or a few items. We continue to grow but I am still the only man in the group.

We used to meet monthly at the center to show and bless what we had made and get yarn for more. Now we meet on Zoom and a few take turns adding to our stash and organizing it and the donations we receive. One member successfully applied for the grant to support the work with Mercy Home.

Everyone needs a hug and prayers such as those that these crafts carry.

I am one who

is descended from the earliest settler colonialists and slaveholders who came to this nation, and now I struggle each day to come to terms with that heritage.

I am one whose ancestors fought on both sides of the Civil War some willing to die to preserve slavery, others willing to die to end it, and I wonder what to make of all that.

I am one who grew up imagining Jesus as white, singing hymns written by dead white males, rarely questioning why all those who worshiped with me were white—after all, everyone around me was white—except for Mrs. Mamie Miller, who cleaned our house and did our laundry.

I am one who grew up in a lily-white suburb, attended lily-white schools, and was friends with the only mixed-race student in my class who hid her pain with jokes and laughter, and I never thought to ask her what it was like to be her.

I am one who learned, in those lily-white schools that Columbus discovered America, that the Indians welcomed the colonizers with open arms, that all great literature and art and music were created by white men, and so many other lies.

I am one who is now trying to see history and art and music and literature from the perspective of those who have been oppressed by white people like me.

Sometimes that learning is very painful, but sometimes it's joyful as well as the boundaries of my long-limited world expand.

I am one who attended a nearly all-white (church-related) university and pledged an all-white sorority and never challenged that, even though my Black roommate could never have joined, and I now feel ashamed of my choices back then.

I am one who has lived, most of my adult life, in diverse neighborhoods, while faithfully participating in the most segregated hour of each week in congregations that are far from diverse.

I am one who believes that Black Lives Matter and whose son is a white police officer, who has paid a high price for his service on levels too many to count, and my heart feels torn in two with every collision between demonstrators and cops.

I am one who hopes and works and prays for a better world even as I benefit from the unearned privileges I enjoy in the world as it is.

What comes next?
For me?
For our nation?
For us all?
I pray, I hope, I ponder.







So Long 2020!

This is the first year in my memory in which there is such collective agreement in the thoughts, feelings and attitudes about said year. Ask anyone. Alexander and the Terrible, Horrible, No Good, Very Bad Day, a children's book from the early 1970s and a 2014 movie, with the same title, shows how a bad day can be shared. But 2020 has shown itself to be the Terrible, Horrible, No Good, Very Bad YEAR!

I am sure, like me, many of you remember March very well. You remember the incredulity of the cancellation of March Madness...and secretly thinking, this will pass. Then the news we are all working from home, while also having the rest of the family home...working or doing Non-Traditional Instruction. But that can't last. Then postponing the Derby in Louisville. And let's be honest, the truly important things that were happening were patients dying alone in the hospital, families unable to gather for funerals and weddings. Graduations everywhere were being cancelled. Yet, still, we all believed--a few more weeks. As we learned more about the disease, people continued to get sick and die. ALL OVER OUR PLANET. Soon it became clear to us that it wasn't going away quickly or easily. We found some acceptance, we shared some collective grief, we adapted.

It seems clear enough that we also learned a lot in 2020. We learned that we have a great capacity for adaptation, for helping each other and for disappointment. But way more importantly, we have been called to look closely at what is important to us, individually and collectively. In addition to the pandemic, we also had political and racial upheaval. 2020 invited us to stand up for what we believe in ways other years have not. It was often uncomfortable, sometimes confusing and full of challenges.

So it is no wonder that sometime back in the summer, people started banking on 2021. It's a lot of pressure on a new year. Before we move to the hopes for 2021, let's acknowledge that 2020 did have its blessings. They are the kind of blessings that we generally don't want, but they are ours. We have earned them.

1. First and most, the blessing of "stay safe at home."
This is hard to receive. The ones we love most, well, we have gotten a lot of each other this year. If we are paying attention, we are likely learning more about how to be kind to each other. This is an amazing blessing.

- **2. Second**, we have learned (I hope) the importance of toilet paper in our lives. We don't need to hoard it. There will be enough.
- 3. Third, Perhaps we are learning to prioritize use of time and resources, and to preference relationships over material goods. Everything was flipped on its head and we were invited to reevaluate our priorities. Most of us didn't get to take a trip this summer, which we have missed. Many of us have done way more hiking in local parks, and have worked with intention to support locally owned businesses. These are all gifts. There are many other blessings that have come to us because of the pandemic. They will continue to unfold as time goes by. And if we are willing, we will continue to learn the lessons offered.

So that brings us to the promise of 2021 and a New Year! I have heard many say they are so ready for 2021 and for things to get back to normal. Here's a news flash: Things aren't going back and our normal didn't include everyone. We are going forward with a greater understanding of who we are and how deeply connected we are to each other. The pandemic has shown us clearly how much our actions impact others. We are invited to take responsibility for ourselves and to engage in our communities in new ways. Usually in a new year, we set some goals (personal and in our work) and commit ourselves to being better versions of ourselves. In that way, this year is the no different. But we can bring greater insight to this process this year!

As a human being, how can I contribute to the collective wellbeing of those I encounter daily? How can I allow the insights of 2020 be a benefit to my community? (And how will we use our experiences to impact our world for the good?) 2020 has shown us that the best response to a New Year is to be bold, expect a lot and lead with our entire hearts! The year will change us. How will we impact the year that we are given? If we have learned the lessons and received the blessings of 2020, perhaps, as a community we will gather together to live lives more fully rooted in love that leads to justice making.



Congratulations, Workshops & Support


